

HEWITSON INQUIRY.

Important Statement by Cyrus McIntyre, a Witness.

Lee Was Seen to Give Hewitson Something out of a Phil.

Lee Denied the Emberton Woman's Story—Jury Sitting Again.

The coroner's jury in the Hewitson tragedy met again this morning when Newton Lee was called and examined regarding the story told by Mrs. Emberton of the finding of a \$20 bill dropped by Hewitson upon the floor in her house and returned to Hewitson in Lee's bar and in his presence. Lee stated that Mrs. Emberton did not give Hewitson any money in his presence, and Annie Maynard told him after Hewitson's death about \$20 being found on the floor, but he did not know whether the money was returned to Hewitson or not.

Previous witnesses were then called, the evidence given by them read over and signed.

Cyrus McIntyre made the important statement in reply to questions by Mr. Crockett that Frank Eaton had told him that he (Eaton) was in Lee's place while Hewitson was there and that he had seen Lee give Hewitson something out of a box for Phil and that Johnson was taking Hewitson. He (McIntyre) also heard Charles Wright tell the same story, and in the presence of other persons, although Wright denied the story when he was on oath before the jury.

The jury will sit again this afternoon when Frank Eaton will be called.

Capt. Thacker, adjutant of No. 4 Co., R. C. R. L., has been transferred to Quebec, and Capt. Nagle has been transferred to London. They will be succeeded here by Capt. Layburn and Lieut. Lister who are to be the new officers here. The changes take place on July 1st.

SCOTT ACT.

Police Magistrate Marsh Made Pertinent Remarks About Scott Act Enforcement.

At the Police Court this morning Judge Marsh made some remarks as to the duties of the Magistrate and the police officers, remarks called forth, said Colonel Marsh, by certain criticisms which had recently been made upon Scott Act enforcement in this city. The Magistrate, said the Judge, has no right to interfere or to direct the police to interfere, or to enter complaints against persons, nor is it the Magistrate's duty to act or to enter upon an action except upon an information duly and lawfully laid.

When such information is laid then it becomes the duty of the Magistrate to use every exertion in his power to bring the parties against whom the information is laid to justice. The powers of the Magistrate are judicial and he has no right and it is not his duty to enter complaints or to lay informations. During the time he had been Police Magistrate he had indicted nearly 700 Scott Act cases and he had never yet had any person complain of his failing to do his duty or of his acting with partiality in any case. The Women's Christian Temperance Union had brought this matter of Scott Act enforcement up several years ago, at which time Attorney General Blair had told them that it was beneath the dignity of a Magistrate to try and seek out informations or to lay complaints against parties.

As regards the city police officers he would say that all instructions to the police are prepared by the Police Magistrate and submitted for approval to the City Council before they come into force. Under the instructions given to the police by approval of the City Council the officers are charged with the enforcement of the Scott Act, and he believed that they have done so and have faithfully done their duty. If any citizen believes or thinks that the police officers are not doing or have not done their duty those citizens should lay a complaint before him and he would fully investigate it and censure or dismiss, if necessary, the policemen who are not doing their duty.

No other Police Magistrate in the province except himself had told the Scott Act, the Magistrate at Moncton is not, nor the Magistrate at Woodstock, or at any other place, but it would seem that some persons think that the Fredericton Police Magistrate is answerable for the acts done or not done by the police officers, and all other persons as well.

Presentation to Sergt. Coombes.

Sergt. Coombes and Byers of the R. C. R. L., yesterday afternoon waited on Hospital Sergt. Coombes, who a short time ago completed his term of service and retired from No. 4 Co., and on behalf of the sergeants men of No. 4 Co. presented him with a handsome gold watch chain and charm, the latter suitably engraved, as an intimation of the esteem in which he is held by his former fellow officers.

County Councillor Timmins.

Yesterday was nomination day for County Councillor to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Councillor McNally. Only one nomination was received, that of Mr. John J. Timmins, of Springfield, who is therefore elected by acclamation.
