SOMETHING TO CONCEAL.

Late Deputy Minister Refuses to Give
Names of Members Composing Atlantic
Trading Co.

OTTAWA, April 11.—In this morning's session of the Agriculture Committee, Mr. Smart, former Deputy Minister of the Interior and now agent of the Atlantic Trading Company, which is receiving a bonus for immigrants, refused to give the names of the members of the Company. He alleged as his reason that the Company was carrying on an illegal business in several European countries which forbade migration agents to work there. This statement contradicts the contract itself, which provides that nothing shall be done in any country contrary to law.

A motion was made in Committee that Mr. Smart be compelled to testify, but was defeated by a straight party vote.

A deputation of village and rural postmasters waited upon the Postmaster General today, asking for an increase in salaries of officers of their class. Among the delegates were the postmasters of Shediac and of Amherst. Mr. Aylesworth said that he would have to decide whether it would be better to grant this request or spend more money improving the service.

OUR HARD COAL SUPPLY.

Local Dealers Want Strike Question Settled Early.

Shipments Must Be Made Early to Keep Prices Down.

Only Two Hundred and Fifty Tons of Coal Now Stored Here.

A local coal dealer told a reporter today if a coal strike resulted from the agitation in the mining regions this city would feel the effect very much. It is estimated that there is now in storage here only about 250 tons of hard coal and this includes that held by all the dealers and, if a general strike ensues, the dealer referred to could not see where there would be very much more to make the total supply for next winter. Already orders that were sent in by local dealers for delivery during the coming season have been cancelled by the companies.

It is most necessary that the strike be settled before next fall if the people of Fredericton are to have any more than the 250 tons of hard coal now on hand and perhaps one or two cargoes which might come in, making in all about 750 tons as their total supply of hard coal for next winter. It is also necessary for this city that the question of whether there is to be a strike or not be settled before June or July if Fredericton people are to get their coal at the prices that have ruled for some time past. It is a well known fact, that owing to the channel of the St. John river being in need of dredging at certain points, coal laden vessels can only come here when the water is pretty high without lightering and if the shipments cannot be made from Pennsylvania early in the summer there is not much chance of landing the coal here so as to have it sell at the present prices next winter.

MAN IN MASK.

Creating Considerable Alarm Amongst
Female Portion of Ontario Town.

INGERSOLL, Ont., April 11.—His face hidden behind a black mask, an unknown man walked through the front door into the house of Charles Foster, Victoria street, last night. Mrs. Foster, alone in the house, was so badly frightened by the sight of the mask that she fainted. Her husband, who was in the yard at the time, heard her scream, but when he reached the house the man had departed. On Saturday night a young lady of the same district was followed for some distance by a man wearing a black mask. The man is thought to be crazy.

CHILD MURDER.

Montreal Police Confident That They Will Be Able to Solve Mystery.

MONTREAL, April 11.—The coroner's inquiry into the death of little May Ahern, for whose murder three men are now being held by the police on suspicion, which was adjourned from last week until today, was further adjourned until tomorrow. This was done at the request of the police department, which informed Coroner McMahon that by tomorrow they would be in a position to offer definite and conclusive proof in the case.

The case which the police are preparing against James Hackett, the latest man to be taken into custody in connection with the Ahern child murder, is said to be growing exceptionally strong. It is semi-officially announced that new witnesses have been found who are prepared to swear that they saw Hackett in the vicinity of the Ahern home on the afternoon of the tragedy. It was in order to get this evidence into proper shape that the police asked the coroner to adjourn the inquest until tomorrow, when they hope to be able to have Hackett confronted with a definite charge of murder.

RECEIVED SAD NEWS.

Admiral Seymour Informed of Death of His Brother in England.

WINNIPEG, Man., April 11.—Admiral Seymour, who accompanies Prince Arthur, has received a cablegram announcing the death of his brother, Venerable Archdeacon Seymour of Barnstable. Archdeacon Seymour was born in 1841. In consequence of his brother's death, Admiral Seymour did not take part in any of the functions in honor of the Prince yesterday.

NO COMMISSION YET.

Ontario Government Has Not Appointed R. R. Gamay to Temiskaming Mining Commission.

TORONTO, April 11.—The rumor that R. R. Gamay, M. P. E., would be appointed upon the Temiskaming Mining Commission is emphatically contradicted. The appointment of such a commission has not been considered by the government.

BURIED IN LAVA.

Another Town of Ten Thousand Inhabitants Said to Be a Victim to Vesuvius.

NAPLES, April 11.—The Mattino in its issue today asserts that Sarno, a town in the province of Salerno, has been destroyed. It was impossible to verify this printed report this morning.

Sarno is a town of some ten thousand people and is situated about ten miles east of Mount Vesuvius. So widespread is the catastrophe caused by the eruption of Vesuvius, that it is estimated that it will require an organized body of 100,000 men and the expenditure of many millions of dollars to raze the houses made unsafe for habitation by the accumulation of ashes and cinders on the roofs, erect temporary huts of refuge for the thousands who have been obliged to flee from their city home, then the roofs of buildings that may yet be saved, extricate from the ruins of fallen structures and bury the dead.

CANADIAN STOCKS.

An Apathetic Tone Prevails the Montreal Exchange Today.

MONTREAL, April 11.—This was the dulllest day the stock market has had in months, the circumstance not being unusual prior to the Easter holidays. The only issues which figured to more than a fraction extent in dealings were Montreal St. Railway at 27½; Detroit St. Power 32; Ohio Traction 31½. Quotations for Dominion Iron issues were nominal and unchanged.

Mr. George Hazen's Illness.

Mr. George Hazen, the well known broker is seriously ill, at his home and his daughter, Miss Nellie Hazen, has arrived from Boston in response to a telegram. He is suffering from pneumonia.
