"Henry, while we were calling on the Jibways I saw Mr. Jibway make a peculiar sign to you and shortly afterward both of you hurriedly excused yourselves."


"Why—yes, my dear. John Jibway wished me to step into the library where he had some old volumes to show me. You know, I have a taste for books."
