LONDON, Jan. 31.—A despatch from Constantinople says that the armistice is still unsigned, and the Russians are advancing. The Porte repeatedly telegraphed to the British and French governments but did not receive a reply.

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TELEGRAPHIC MISCELLANY.

Railway speculation is active in Mexico. Gen. Grant approves of President Hayes' Southern policy. His Excellency the Governor-General has returned to Ottawa. Nine millions people are reported starving in the northern provinces of China. Hon. Peter Mitchell has been re-elected for Northumberland by acclamation.

The Japanese Minister to China is reported to have been assassinated by a mob. Cardinal Howard is to be created Archbishop of Edinburgh and Primate of Scotland. Exports from the United States in 1877 exceeded the imports by a hundred and forty million dollars.

A legal contest between twenty-five wealthy children is expected to be decided in the next few days.

The Allan mail steamships will, after this week, leave Halifax for Liverpool on Saturday instead of Sunday. Two thousand cotton operatives have been locked out at Manchester for refusing to accept a reduction of twelve per cent. A Rome despatch reports that the Pope's health has wonderfully improved. He has been up receiving visitors several hours daily.

Two thousand persons are reported to have perished in the burning of a asylum for women and children at Tientsin, China. All the Powers have refused to entertain Cardinal Simeoni's protest against the accession of King Humbert to the Throne of Italy. A Quebec city anti-union despatch says that the hundreds of city-eight thousand dollars' worth of city debentures cannot be accounted for.

Dr. Lafontaine, member for Napierville, in the Quebec Legislature, has given notice of a motion to abolish the Legislative Council. At Washington it is believed the Fishery award was given against the United States because their commissioner was over-zealous in his duties.

The Pope has ratified the plans for the re-establishment of the Scottish hierarchy, and appointed two archbishops and four bishops. Capetown advices say the Cape war is being vigorously prosecuted, and hopes are entertained that the rebellion will speedily be crushed.

From Copenhagen it is reported every preparation has been made for closing the Sound with torpedoes in twenty-four hours should the British fleet be unable to force its way through.

Dr. Fenwick and Worthington, the defendants in the celebrated medical forgery case which is now before the court at Montreal, has been committed for trial. Mr. James Lowther, M.P. for York City, succeeds Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Bart., member for East Gloucester and Chief Secretary for Ireland.

The stock brokers of Montreal are greatly agitated over the proposal of the Montreal Bridge Co. to sell all their contracts and transfers of stock. George Cruikshank, the celebrated artist and caricaturist, has died at the age of 78. He was born in the Metropolitan, Sept. 27th, 1792, and consequently was in his eighty-sixth year.

A site has, it is said, finally been chosen for the Cleopatra obelisk. It is on the Adams Embankment at the top of the Adelaide steps, between the Charing Cross and the Strand. The obelisk is to be placed on a site of 100 feet square, and the foundations are to be laid in the next few days.

IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT.
