LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

A FIRE occurred recently at St. Boniface, Manitoba, that wiped out the business portion of that town.

SMALL pox has again broke out in the Province of Quebec. There are 72 cases at Mount Carmel and twelve at St. Paul.

At the Marquis of Lansdowne's suggestion, the Queen has decided that her Christmas present to the troops in South Africa is to take the form of a tin of chocolate for each man.

The brigantine Carlew, Capt. Winchester, sailed from Summerside on Thursday for Cardiff, Wales, with 26,500 bushels of white oats, loaded by Messrs Toombs & Matheson, Charlottetown.

The sisters of St. Joseph of St. Paul's Min., who have been here for some weeks selecting young girls for their community, left on Tuesday morning accompanied by a number of Island girls.

CHARLES Coghlan, the actor, died at Galveston, Texas, on Monday of gastritis. His wife is prostrated with grief at the bedside. The body will be sent to P. E. Island, his former summer home.

MILITARY men in Toronto, are of opinion that the second contingent will, in the near future, be sent from Canada; and that there may be no delay when orders to that effect come, preparations are being made to have all men who are willing to go ready at any moment.

SIR Thomas Lipton, in view of the fact that his steam yacht Eria cannot be utilized by the Government as a hospital ship, has sent ten thousand pounds to the Princess of Wales, to be used at her discretion for the benefit of the sailors and soldiers on active service.

The annual report of the Inspector of Insurance for 1898 has been issued. The total amount of premiums received in Canada on all forms of insurance was \$29,172,000, and the total amount of claims paid was \$10,102,000 and British and American companies the remainder.

It is probable that the new Prince of Wales College will be finished about the middle of January. The carpenters are completing their work, and the work of heating and plumbing is being pushed forward with all the speed possible. It is the intention to open the College as soon as it is finished.

A few days ago Mrs Donald McQueen died at her son's residence, Victoria, B. C., aged 100 years. The deceased came from Scotland 60 years ago and settled with her husband at Victoria, B. C., which was then a wilderness. The remains were laid to rest in Belfast cemetery beside those of her husband, who died 30 years ago at the age of 80 years.

REGARDING last Thursday's fight at Belmont it is now stated that 81 Boers were killed. Sixty-four wagons were burned. A large quantity of powder, 50,000 rounds of ammunition and 750 shells were blown up. Commandant Albrecht, chief of the Orange Free State artillery commanded the Boer artillery. General De la Ruyse was in chief command.

The drawing in connection with the lottery in aid of the new church at Indian River, will take place in Indian River Hall, on Monday evening the 18th December next. There will be a large social and musical and literary entertainment in connection with the drawing. A good time may be expected. Persons having lottery books, will oblige by returning the same before that date.

A MONTREAL despatch says that by an arrangement with the London and Lancashire, the Standard and British Assurance companies, each married man with the Quebec company going to South Africa carries an additional \$500 on his life. After the announcement that the Government did not intend to insure the men, a fund was started by patriotic people of Quebec, and the deal has just been closed.

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

TREASURE IN SUNKEN WRECK.

The wreckers working on the sunken armored cruiser Almirante Oquendo off Santiago de Cuba on Wednesday last discovered a chest containing \$19,000 in Spanish gold which the Gendoya Company, the firm employing the divers will retain. Work on the cruiser has been in progress for five months and many thousand dollars worth of treasure has been secured. The safe was found in the bottom where it fell during the burning of the ship. Only a few days ago the wreckers began on the torpedo boat destroyer Furor. They have already found a service of heavy silver plate. The wrecking operations have proved a source of large returns to the companies, estimated at \$500,000.

INTERVIEW WITH LIEUT. CHURCHILL.

In an interview Lieut. Winston Churchill, correspondent of the London Morning Post, who was captured by the Boers near Estcourt, said that the confinement of the prisoners was close, though having regard for the circumstances of war, no complaint could be made against this. He added that he had had many discussions with the Boers. They mostly regretted the war, which they declared, had arisen from misrepresentation, but the spite of the Boers in the field, in spite of their many privations, is most determined. Lieut. Churchill believes that there is small chance of an early peace. In his opinion the struggle will be bloody and protracted.

THE KHALIFA KILLED IN BATTLE.

Lord Cromer, the British Minister at Cairo, has received the following despatch from Gen. Kitchener: "Wingate's force came up with the Khalifa's force seven miles south-east of Omdurman and attacked it. After a sharp fight we took his position. The Khalifa, who was surrounded by a bodyguard of emirs (generals) was killed, and all the principal emirs were killed or captured except Osman Digna, who escaped. The day was a victory, and the British army was victorious. The Khalifa's force was defeated, their whole camp was taken and thousands surrendered. The Khalifa, referred to as being killed in battle, is Abdullah El Talibi, the great chief of the Soudan, who has given the British so much trouble. It may be said that the power of the Khalifa is probably over, but he was one of the three Khalifas who, in 1881, helped the famous Mahdi to overthrow the government of Egypt in Eastern Soudan and establish the despotism of the Mahdi in its place."
