

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

A passenger train was derailed at Progranich station on the Chinese Eastern Railway Sunday and 110 persons were killed or injured.

Five men were killed and forty wounded by the explosion of a bomb on board the steamer Haverford, which arrived at Liverpool from Philadelphia Thursday morning.

The Canadian team to compete in this year's rifle contest in England sailed from Montreal on Thursday last on the Allan liner Turlin. The team is commanded by Lieut. Col. Wilson.

No less than four distinct earthquake shocks were felt in San Francisco on Friday night last between 9 and 11 o'clock. At least two of these shocks were felt in Oakland.

The British battleship Renfrew was in collision Friday in the English Channel with the battleship Resolution. The latter was damaged but the former must dock to ascertain the extent of her injuries.

Dr. Percy D. McLeod, formerly of Penobscot, N.B., was expelled by the Massachusetts Medical society at a meeting held in Boston on Thursday last for his part in the suit case mystery. The vote was unanimous and without discussion.

Another tragedy occurred at Niagara Falls on Friday, and was witnessed by a cab driver named McCachere and two gentlemen in his cab. An unknown man came down the river in a small skiff, and at the head of Great Island his boat upset and, in spite of his desperate struggles, he was drawn into the swift current and was carried over the falls.

Monday morning the Italian steamer Vincenzo Bonanno, which went ashore on Fire Island bar, Long Island, New York, Sunday, was lying broadside on the beach. The captain had ceased throwing the cargo into the sea. During the night he made every effort to free his vessel but was unsuccessful. The life savers remained on board part of the night. At an early hour Monday morning the wind was from the east and the weather threatening with rain and sea increasing. There are 37 men in the crew and one passenger aboard.

An Ottawa despatch of the 14th says: It is expected that two government cruisers will be employed this season in the patrol of the Canadian possessions in the far north. One, under Major Moodie, will be assigned to Hudson Bay, and the other under Captain Bernier will be sent further north to explore what is known as Baffin's Bay, Lancaster Sound and Smith Channel, probably as far as Cape Sabine, which was visited by Commander Howe three years ago. Wonder will they be as luxuriously fitted out as "The Arctic"?

It is reported from St. Stephen, N.B., that American fishermen had, on Saturday last, exploded dynamite in American waters near the international boundary line, doing great injury to fish in Canadian waters. The authorities at Ottawa were advised and the Commander of the Government cruiser Curlew was instructed to proceed at once to the scene of trouble and render all possible protection to the fishing in Canadian waters. Representations have also been made to the authorities at Washington, through the American Consul at Whitepool, Campbell.

At Bayville, near Cape Tormentine, N.B., on Saturday night, a lady named Reade, who carries from that station the mail brought by train on the N. B. and P. E. I. Railway had a most extraordinary accident. The half-drawn box was being slowly getting to his feet without a scratch.

Prince Edward Island made a good showing in the Inter-maritime regatta at Halifax on Friday, taking only 16 points in winning the trophy. The scores stood Nova Scotia 685; P. E. I. 676; New Brunswick 666. The day was an ideal one for shooting with a heavy wind blowing across the track. The individual scores of the Island team was as follows:—Capt. Shaw 31, 28, 30, total 89. Sgt. Lawson 29, 28, 27, total 84. Gr. Fries 22, 25, 30, total 77. Lt. Blue 28, 31, 27, total 86. Lt. Moore 27, 22, 23, total 82. Capt. Smith 31, 23, 26, total 80. Sgt. Crook 27, 27, 26, total 80. Lt. Beer 27, 29, 22, total 78.

During the fierce northerly gale which prevailed at Sydney on Thursday night the Grayling and Zella, the two largest yachts in the harbor, dragged their anchors and were driven ashore at the shipyard. Neither is damaged any extent and can easily be floated. The storm was extremely felt at Glace Bay. Nearly all the lobster pots at that section of the coast were destroyed. A little French fishing schooner while going round Point Island lost her captain and a sailor overboard, but fortunately the next sea brought both within reach of ropes flung to them and they were pulled on board. The vessel lost her anchor. She reached Morien Friday evening.

The Canadian Pacific Steamship Empress of Britain left Miramichi at 10 o'clock on Sunday morning, the 10th inst., and arrived at Rimouski at 2:47 Saturday morning last, making the round trip between the ports on opposite sides of the Atlantic in 5 days 16 hours and 47 minutes. Adding to this the difference in time, equal to 44 hours, the voyage is a record one of 5 days 21 hours and 17 minutes. This beats the Allan liner Virginian's time, the former record, by an hour and three minutes. The Empress reached dock at Quebec at 12:50 noon Saturday, and the special train that took off the mails and passengers at Rimouski reached Montreal in time for the passengers to dine at midday, after breakfasting in London on the previous Saturday.

The steamer Empress left here on Sunday afternoon to enter on her route between Summerside and Point du Chêne, Monday morning. A number of ladies and gentlemen, directors of the company and their lady friends and others, took the trip to Summerside. On Monday morning the gallant Captain was enthusiastically welcomed back to Summerside in command of the new steamer. He and the company were warmly congratulated on the acquisition of the Empress to their line. An address of welcome from the town of Summerside, the Board of Trade and the citizens of the western capital, was presented to Captain Cameron in the steamer's saloon. The captain made a suitable reply, and A. E. Inge and Benjamin Rogers, Esq., replied in suitable terms for the Steam Navigation Company.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

Dr. Joseph F. Force, former president of the North Western National Life Insurance Company, of Minneapolis, was on Monday sentenced to serve three and a half years in the state prison. The charge was grand larceny. This is the first conviction in connection with the insurance scandals there.

There was a pretty fair attendance at the market yesterday—inside especially. But it was somewhat lower, apart from that there was not much difference in the prices, as will be seen in the price list.

The tower of the New Broadway Methodist Church at Winnipeg, 100 feet in height collapsed Monday morning. The heavy stonework was undermined at the foundation by heavy rains. The damage amounts to \$10,000. Several workmen engaged in plastering made a hurried escape. Fortunately the collapse did not take place on the main part of the structure.

A case of murder, committed four years ago near Sharbot Lake, Ont., is being looked up. Mrs. Noddy told, at Bathurst, Ont., that two boys, Babcock and Martin, supposed to be drowned in April, 1905, were murdered by a man now serving a term in the penitentiary and an Indian who lives at Rice Lake. She says that it was told her where the bodies were buried and the authorities have found bones in the ground. The boys were gathering logs and had between \$70 and \$80 with them. The Indian knew this. An investigation will be held.
