Simple Funeral Services for Harriman, Financier and Empire Builder. New York, Sept. 13.—Edward Harriman was buried this afternoon in a little country church yard on the Ramapo Hill. The casket containing the body of the financier was borne down the mountain side in the plain country hearse in which many of the humble employees of the Harriman estate have taken their last earthly journey. The orphans and hot houses blossoms of the rich mingled with the simple flowers along the mountain side, the tribute of the farmers of Orange who knew Mr. Harriman as a friend and neighbor. It was Harriman's wish that the services might be simple and that the country folk among whom he has lived for 22 years might follow him to the grave. The Harriman of Wall street they knew not at all; the builder of railroads, the man whose neighbor was a friend of theirs. Early in the morning Archbishop Nelson and the Rev. J. Holmes McGinnis went to the Tower Hill house, where a special service was held for the members of the family receiving holy communion. Arrived at the little stone church on the steep hillside the remains were received by Archbishop Nelson and clergy men and then followed the beautiful burial service of the Anglican liturgy; the hymns being "Abide With Me" and "There is a Land of Pure Delight". Thence it was borne to the grave by the roadside he built, the solemn words of the committal and all was over, then back to New York went the frock coated money to the men and less to the buildings. This is the only municipally-owned street railway line in Canada that such a thing has been done. The commissioners were not in favor of it but the council passed the resolution without a hitch. The construction of a \$450,000 Y. M. C. A. building will be commenced very shortly. R. G. Professor Thomson Struck With Forward Educational Movement. Winnipeg, Sept. 13.—Sir J. J. Thomson addressed the university club in Manitoba Hall today. He said that he had been in the country and had not got enough money for their services and that he had to get much. This was a state of affairs greatly to be deplored.
