

TERRIFIC BATTLE WITH ANARCHISTS

EAST END OF LONDON SCENE OF STIRRING FIGHT BETWEEN POLICE AND ANARCHISTS

London, Jan. 3.—All London has been stirred by the terrific battle waged today between anarchists and hundreds of police, infantry and artillery. How many anarchists took part in the engagement, which was fought in and around a barricaded house in Sidney street in the east end, is not definitely known, but so far after a search of the debris of the burned structure, portions of half two bodies have been discovered. The remains consist of the trunk and part of the head of one man and a few charred bones of another. It is the opinion of some that two desperadoes alone held the police and military at bay.

Thousands Witnessed Spectacle
Thousands from all parts of London witnessed the thrilling spectacle—a steady rain of bullets, flashes of fire, smoke pouring from the windows, the house in flames and finally the desperate men on the roof shouting defiance until they fell into the seething mass below.

A police sergeant, searching for the burglars who only a few nights ago killed four police, was reconnoitering around the Sidney street den in the early hours of the morning when suddenly a shot was fired and the sergeant fell with a bullet through the lung. A call for police was sounded and the entire neighborhood was cordoned. People were driven from their houses and a pitched battle began between those fortified in the house and hundreds of police.

Battery of Artillery Summoned
The Scots Guards were hastily dispatched to the scene and later a battery of artillery with gatling guns came at the double quick. The pieces were placed in position but they did not open fire.

A steady stream of bullets played between the contending forces. The guardsmen took up sheltered positions firing volley after volley into the house. Hisses of steam were cast in all directions and lighted in the hope that the desperadoes would be smoked out. At last, sparks were observed shooting from the windows, accompanied by clouds of smoke and here and there a jet of flame. A detachment of firemen stretched hoses and threw water on the adjoining structures. Soon they directed their streams against the strongest house and the desperadoes which was now burning fiercely.

Driven to the Roof
Driven from the lower floors, the anarchists made their way to the roof, where it seemed to the watching thousands several forms could be perceived amidst the driving smoke. Then the roof collapsed and the men disappeared.

Not since the news of British disasters at the opening of the South African war has the country been so aroused as by today's scenes at Stepney. The newspapers call today for all effective means of dealing with the growing alien immigration, not doubt being held that the desperadoes who fell today were anarchists.

A search of the beveled house after the ruins had been cooled a little revealed in a cupboard a large number of what appeared to be metal dynamite bombs in an unfinished state. At present there is no evidence that the house had any other occupants than the two whose charred bodies were found. A number of injured civilians received minor injuries.

Crowds of Sight-Seeers
Immense crowds of sight-seeers inspected the neighborhood until a late hour tonight, but a strict police guard was maintained and it was impossible for those without authority to get close to the half-wrecked building. Two families who occupied the lower floors of this building were withdrawn by the police before the fighting began and they profess to know nothing of how the desperadoes gained access to the house. The latter appeared to have been in rooms rented by a Russian woman, Bessie Gerschen, who is now under arrest with other suspects against whom, however, no charge has yet been made.

Police Are Irritated
The police officials show irritation at the calling out of the soldiers. They say that they could have handled the affair without the help of the soldiers. The last occasion on which the army was so employed was at the time of the notorious Trafalgar Square riots, when John Burns was arrested. Even then the soldiers did not fire.

Epidemic of Scarlet Fever
Winipeg, Jan. 3.—An epidemic of scarlet fever, which is apparently beyond the control of the local health officers, is reported among the foreign population between lakes Winipeg and Manitoba, the Woodlands, Teulon and St. Laurent being the districts principally affected. Provincial authorities have been appealed to and appointed Dr. Mingrove to handle the matter. The principal difficulty is the proper enforcement of quarantine among the foreigners.

TO DRIVE OUT JAPANESE.
Secret Society Organized Among Chinese in Manchuria.
Pekin, Jan. 3.—It is reported that the Chinese in Manchuria have organized a secret society of large membership with the object of driving the Japanese out of the country. The reports that the Japanese are strengthening their garrisons in Manchuria has caused considerable unrest in certain circles here, where rumors of Japanese aggressiveness are spreading. Similar stories that the Russians purpose to occupy Harbin and the intermediate country from the frontier are circulated.

SEISMIC DISTURBANCES.
Recorded at University of Kansas—5,000 Miles Away.
Lawrence, Kan., Jan. 3.—A severe earthquake disturbance is now taking place, according to the seismograph of the University of Kansas, at a distance of about 5,000 miles from here. The disturbance began at 5:30 p.m. and thus far consisted of five shocks. The heaviest began at 6:12 and lasted twelve minutes.

Prof. Cady, of the University, in giving an account of seismograph records said that the motion of the tremors appeared nearly equal in north and south and east and west directions.

100,000 FIRE IN LACOMBE. Victoria Hotel and Adjoining Buildings Completely Destroyed.

Lacombe Alta., Jan. 3.—Fire broke out in the Victoria Hotel block about 6:15 this morning. The whole building was completely destroyed, together with the buildings adjoining. The losses are: The Victoria Hotel block, Hop Chung's restaurant and laundry, W. F. Puffer's meat market and the Western Implement Company. The stock losses are: Wait & Hay's general store, the Albert Drug Company, drugs and stationery, A. M. Campbell, partly damaged.

REPORTED THAT REVOL HAS BEGUN IN HONDURA

Decisive Battle is Expected to be Waged in the Streets of Puerto Cortes Within Next Days—Hornet Reported Outside Harbor.

Puerto Cortes, Honduras, Dec. 25, via New Orleans, Jan. 3.—The long expected revolt of the adherents of Manuel Bonilla against the Davila government in Honduras has broken out. A decisive battle is expected to be waged in the streets of this city within the next few days. The correspondent of the Associated Press is definitely informed that the revolution, a gunboat Hornet was sighted off this port last night late, and that preparations are being made for an attack upon the city by land and sea.

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ERSKINE DISTRICT FOR MIXED FARMING

Heavy Shipments of Grain, Cattle, Hays, Butcher, Cheese, Poultry and Eggs From This District—Cool at Content—Fish and Furs at Buffalo Lake.

Erskine, Jan. 2.—Erskine, on the Lacombe branch of the C.P.R., is forty-two miles east of Lacombe, so 120 miles from Edmonton. Erskine residents boast of the resources of the district and the great advantages here for that most profitable branch of agriculture called mixed farming.

To the west and a little south coal is found in abundance at the settlement of Content. This ensures plenty of cheap fuel for use in the stoves or the boilers of steam engines. The settlers of the district seem well satisfied and quite content in the Erskine district.

The C.P.R. have spent a lot of money here building a fine new depot, the first class stock and a section house. There are the usual sidings and water is pumped from Maiden Lake to this water tank which is placed conveniently so that a passenger train can stop at the station and secure water at the same time. This will be a great convenience when this line is extended eastwards to connect with the line to Moose Jaw when faster train service will be more important than it seems to be at present.

Good Yields of Grain and Vegetables
The grain crop of Erskine district is estimated at 125,000 bushels of wheat, oats and barley, of which about 50,000 bushels will be marketed. The yields average 15 bushels of wheat, 50 bushels of oats and 30 bushels of barley to the acre.

The following are a few of the good yields reported: A. L. Hall, 25 bushels wheat to the acre; Ed. Clarke, 37 bushels wheat to the acre and 80 bushels oats to the acre; G. Gilmer, 40 bushels oats to the acre; A. L. Payne had 30 bushels wheat to the acre from a field of 100 acres and 55 bushels oats from a field of 160 acres; L. M. Doughty, 12 miles south of Erskine, had 25 bushels wheat and 20 bushels barley to the acre; D. M. Gilbert had 20 bushels oats to the acre.

Vegetables of all kinds are grown with success. It is said that pumpkins as large as waterpails are grown at Erskine. One settler said he had raised a corn which had had more ears every year.

Large Shipments of Cattle and Hays.
The cattle shipments of the district are double that of 1902. Three thousand head totaling over \$150,000 have been shipped from here this fall. The hays shipments are three or four times what they were last year. It is estimated that the total shipments will be about 1200 carloads. The price of \$10 per ton will leave \$12,000 in the settlement.

Ideal for Mixed Farming.
This district is ideal for mixed farming owing to the abundance of molasses for ensuring a good growth of grass and pasture and hay. The convenient location to the market centres of the province and its good roads facilities will ensure a steady demand for the mixed agricultural products.

Erskine's Business List.
This place has doubled in size since last year, and now on Erskine's busy streets there are: Three general stores, one hardware store, two butchers, a barber, a drug store, a doctor, a pool room, a bowling alley, a jeweller, a music store, a harness shop, a restaurant, a lumber yard, two hotels, a licensed bar, a justice of the peace, two implement agencies, a blacksmith shop, two livery barns, a dray line, a feed chopping mill, and the Alberta Pacific Elevator. The Traders' Bank has a branch here in charge of E. M. Hughes, manager, with two clerks. The West Coast Grain Co. have secured a site for an elevator to be erected at Erskine.

NEW POLICY LAID DOWN.
As to a Railway's Responsibility for Goods in Transit.
Washington, Jan. 3.—That an initial carrier of inter-state commerce is liable for loss to shipments in transit not only on its own lines but those of connecting lines was today declared constitutionally by the Supreme Court. The policy was interpreted in the so-called Carmack amendment to the Hepburn rate law, Justice Lorton announced the opinion of the court. Justice Lorton, who today took his place as member of the court, argued the case before the court on behalf of the railways.

ABANDON CANADIAN ROUTE.
Mails From Jamaica to Go Direct to Great Britain.
Kingston, Jamaica, Jan. 3.—In view of Jamaica's opposition to the transfer of mails to England and Canada, the British postmaster-general has arranged to convey the mails direct to the termination of the Elder Dempster service next month. The new arrangement will be on the postpaid system. The Jamaican government has decided to amend the pure food law and prohibit the importation of salted fish. The amendment hereafter, flour must be transported to Jamaica in barrels.
