Winnipeg, July 6—At this belated time the Canadian Pacific railway is rousing to a sense of its responsibility in harvesting what at the present time promises to be the two hundred million and over bushels of the Canadian prairie wheat. It was stated this morning at the company offices that a number of enquiries had been telegraphed to large employers of labor all over of the Massey-Harris company and Eastern Canada asking whether they could spare men.

Answers received to date show that the labor situation is not encouraging. Instead of being able to spare men employers say they have not enough to meet their normal requirements. It is possible though that an altogether novel experiment will be made of bringing in from seven to ten thousand men from British Columbia points, mainly from Vancouver.

It has been pointed out to Sir William Whyte that owing to the exceptional labor conditions prevailing at Vancouver a large number of men are out of work The Canadian Pacific has been asked to grant the same cheap harvesters fares from the coast as are offered from Eastern Canada points. There is little doubt but that these will be conceded and that the prairie west in its hour of need will thus get help from the coast. Rates


