Cable News.

PETERSBURG, To-day.
Newspapers as widely differing in policies as the Vrnja and the Reich denounce Austria's effort to prevent Servians from taking the fruits of victory. The Vrnja says, we are reluctant to believe Italy and Germany with their own tradition of struggles for freedom are supporting Austrian threats, but if Rome and Berlin have forgotten the histories of Italy and Germany, one cannot suppose that they are ignorant of the existence of Russia, France and Britain. The Reich urges the Triple Entente immediately to confront the Triple Alliance. It thinks a compromise possible, although a port in the Adriatic is indispensable for Servia.

LONDON, To-day.
The Bulgarian attack on the Chatalja lines goes on unrelentingly, according to a correspondent at the front, further Turkish positions have been captured. There is another unconfirmed report that Monastir has been captured. This and the capture of Dibra, an important town in Albania by Servians, and heavy fighting constitute all the military news of importance since Saturday. Some idea of the bloody nature of this war may be formed from the fact that it is estimated that 150,000 men have been put out of action on both sides since the opening of hostilities.

HALIFAX, To-day.
The Halifax Herald this morning published what is evidently an inspired dispatch from Ottawa, forecasting the probable Naval policy of the

Government. The despatch states the Premier will make announcement before Xmas recess. Probably at a very early date the Government will make an emergency contribution for the Naval defense of the Empire. Afterwards the Premier will propose a permanent Naval Policy of Imperial Naval co-operation to be ratified by the people at the polls before becoming effective.

SALONIKI, To-day.
The crew of the Turkish paddle-wheel dispatch boat, at which the Greek torpedo boat fired when she sank the Turkish battleship "Feth-i Bülend" mutinied and shot the captain and other officers, many men also were killed.

Australia's Huge Dam.

A wonderful piece of engineering is the new Burrinjuck Dam in New South Wales. It is the second largest dam in the world—second, of course, to the Assuan Dam—and although it is not yet finished, it has already come into use. It is set between two granite mountains that rise from sides of the Murrumbidge River.

Forty-five miles of the river are held back by this great wall in the neck of a gorge, and when the dam has risen to its full height of 240 ft. the enclosed lake will be half as large again as Sydney Harbor. Two hundred miles further down the river at Berrumbidge another great work is contemplated. When the combined system is complete between five and six million acres will be served.

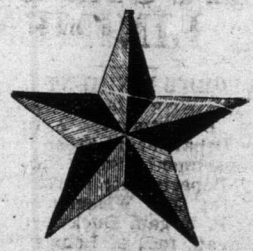
