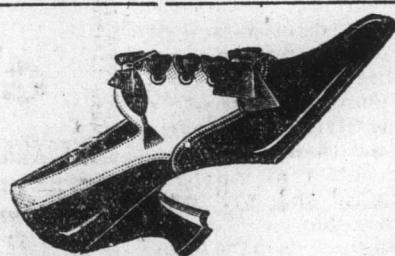

### Corrects Statist'cs.

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir:—In your issue of the 17th  
inst., under the heading "Recruiting  
Statistics" of places with a popula-  
tion between 110 and 130, I notice  
that you give Grand River 3rd place  
with 7.62% and also state the popula-  
tion according to 1911 census was 118.  
Now, Mr. Editor, this is grossly in-  
correct, either intentionally or other-  
wise. I defy anybody to find in the  
1911 census a place called Grand  
River with a population of 118. What  
the census returns state is this:  
Grand River:—  
The Block . . . . . 59  
Searston . . . . . 140  
Upper Ferry . . . . . 54  
Back Lands . . . . . 35  
Doyle . . . . . 70  
Great Codroy (North Side) . . 118  
Thus making a total of 485, and the 9  
recruits mentioned are drawn from  
these places. Therefore the % should  
be 1.82 and not 7.62, thus giving Grand  
River 16th place and not 3rd.  
I make this correction in justice to  
other places.

### Free Trade Strength.

People are talking very freely just  
now about the failure of Free Trade,  
and trying to make out, or at least as-  
serting loudly that the war has proved  
the Free Traders wrong and the Tariff  
Reformers right. Nothing could be  
further from the truth. It is Protec-  
tion that has failed in this war, and  
fallen very badly; Free Trade has  
been a triumphant success. Almost as  
soon as the war broke out, all the na-  
tions of Western Europe, even those  
that were not actually engaged in  
fighting, who levied Protective tar-  
iffs on food stuffs, were obliged to sus-  
pend them. This means that just

when they wanted money more than  
ever before, they were obliged to take  
less. The only countries that were  
able to go on receiving their revenues  
as before were the three that have  
Free Trade in food—Great Britain,  
Denmark and Holland. The Free  
Trade system stood the strain of war,  
while Protection collapsed hopelessly  
under it.
