Halifax Marathon.

BELL WAS SIXTH WHEN HE DROPPED OUT.

Mail from Halifax on Saturday to story of the Halifax Marathon. Seventy-two starters toed the line out of 114 entries. Vinicombe and Bell every hand. How long is this to last?

Vemiting followed and he had to retire from the race. He later was driven back in a motor car with his manager, Vinicombe. Many Newfoundlanders in Halifax interested in the race, particularly Bell, happened to hear the announcement from the starting point that after 15 minutes of running Bell was reported officially in sixth place. He was not spoken of in the second announcement and Newfoundlanders took it for returning home in a motor car, haveasily by Rogers in the slow time of 62 min. 15 sec., with Gorley, of St. Pairick's, a dark horse, second in Patrick's, a dark horse, second in 62.55. St. Clair Leslie of the Wander-ers was third. Sixty runners finished the course. Bell has been ill all last week and did not take part in the 5 mile track or 6 mile road race which was run on Friday last. A message was received by Dr. Power from Vinicombe yesterday morning saying that he and Bell were leaving by the Sachem.


