JUNIOR FOOTBALL RACE ON PROGRAMME.

The regular weekly meeting of the Regatta Committee held last night in the T. A. Armoury, was well attended and quite a lot of business in connection with the Derby was cleared up. Following the reading of the minutes, the Hon. Secretary read a communication from the C.L.B. Post Club stating that owing to the sportsmanlike spirit in offering the Guard, they would be taking part in the Regatta as usual. The Secretary was ordered to write both Clubs expressing the Committee's appreciation of their action.

Mr. J. P. Creely, on behalf of the Regatta Committee, reported that he had interviewed six city jewellers and had also received catalogues. The conclusion of the Committee was that the medals be made locally after a pattern from a medal presented at a previous Regatta. The matter was left entirely in the hands of the Special Committee to finalize.

Secretary Power of the Junior Football League reported that the Committee asking that they be given a place on the programme. On motion of Mr. C. E. Hunt, seconded by Mr. A. W. O'Reilly, the request of the League was unanimously granted, and the Junior Football Race has been given third place on the programme. The Junior League will be requested to frame the rules governing their race.

Regarding the matter of having band concerts at the Lake Side, the Brigades were given to play on the Green from now to Regatta Day. The C.C.C. Band will start the programme on Thursday evening next.

The collectors for the different wards were appointed and they will begin work immediately. To ensure the success of the day the usual hearty response is necessary and no doubt it will be given. The Committee asking that they be given a place on the programme for 1923 was decided on as follows:—

Regarding the matter of prizes it was decided that gold and silver medals would be awarded for all events except the Laborers and Fishermen's Races. Cash prizes for these events will be given. In dealing with the matter of prizes, the following was passed unanimously:—

WHEREAS there has been for some years past, misunderstandings among crews participating in the Regatta on the subject of special prizes presented by individuals.

RESOLVED: That whilst in no way desiring to interfere with the wishes of any person who might offer such prizes this Committee will not have the same form part of its official prize list.

It is possible that a nominal fee, according to space occupied will be charged tent holders this year as it has in the past been difficult to prevent a few people from monopolizing the course. The amount collected will help to defray the cost of cleaning up after the tents are removed.

The Regatta Committee reported that they are arranging to have a motor boat on the pond during the coming week. Before the meeting concluded, Mr. W. J. Higgins expressed his regret that the juvenile race had to be dropped last year, as only one boat entered in case sufficient crews apply this year, the race will again be included. The meeting adjourned at 11 p.m. to meet again next Friday at 8.30 p.m.

UNVEILING CEREMONY TO-MORROW.

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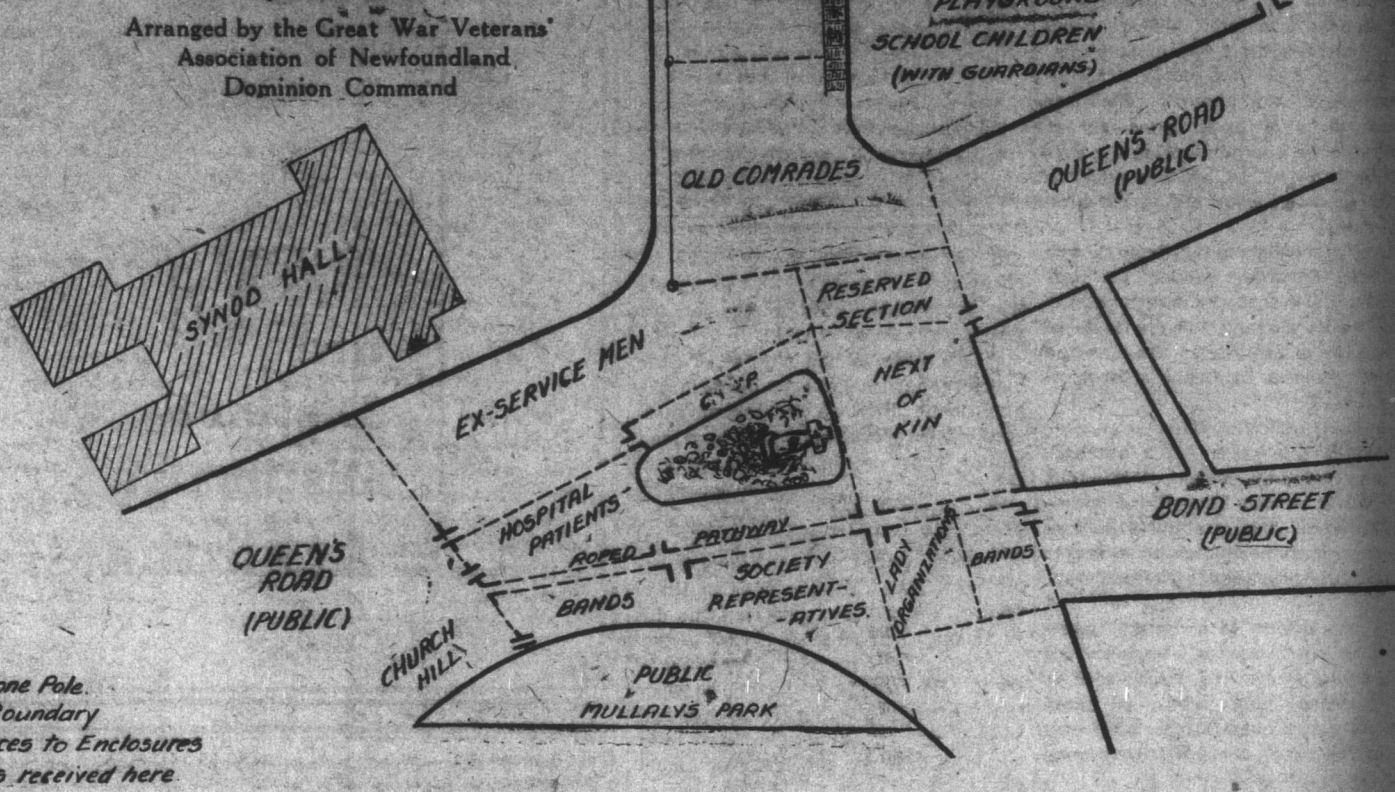
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MEMORIAL DAY SERVICES

SUNDAY, JULY 1st, 1923

AT THE SERGEANT'S MONUMENT QUEEN'S ROAD

Arranged by the Great War Veterans' Association of Newfoundland, Dominion Command



Official Programme Memorial Day Service, Sunday, July 1st, 1923.

9.45 a.m. War Veterans (with or without uniforms), Brigades, Old Comrades, Boy Scouts, and Girl Guides, (exception Royal Man Catholic parties who will parade at 10.15 a.m. sharp), are asked to parade on the Prince's Rink Parade Grounds as follows: (a) C.L.B. Cadets Band; Church of England War Veterans; Church Lads' Brigade Cadets; C.L.B. Old Comrades; Boy Scouts and Girl Guides.

(b) M.G.B. Band; Methodist War Veterans; M.G.B. Old Comrades; Boy Scouts and Girl Guides. (c) Newfoundland Highlanders Pipe Band; Presbyterian War Veterans; Congregational War Veterans; Newfoundland Highlanders; N. H. Old Comrades; Boy Scouts and Girl Guides.

(d) No. 1 S.A. Silver Band; Salvation Army War Veterans, etc. (e) War Veterans; Catholic Cadet Corps; Boy Scouts and Girl Guides.

10.15 a.m. The whole of the above excepting para. (e) will march to their respective Churches for Divine Service, via Gower Street. 10.30 a.m. Roman Catholic Parties will march to the R.C. Cathedral. 10.45 a.m. Memorial Service in the City Churches.

11.00 a.m. Memorial Mass, R.C. Cathedral. 12. Noon (1) War Veterans form up in mass formation in enclosures allocated them. (2) Brigades, Old Comrades, Society Representatives, Lady Organizations, and all Officials, etc., move into enclosures allocated them.

12.01 p.m. Colour Party with King's and Regimental colours move into enclosure immediately in front of Memorial, and will be received with a General Salute. 12.03 p.m. His Excellency Sir William Allardice, K.C.M.G., accompanied by Suite, the Prime Minister, Sir Richard Anderson Squires, K.C.M.G., K.C., L.L.B., and Party arrive and are received by the G.W.V.A.

Dominion Executive, A Royal Salute will be given. 12.05 p.m. The Pupils from the City Colleges and Schools, accompanied by the M.G.B. Band, under the direction of Mr. Chas. Hutton, will sing the hymn "O God our Help in Ages Past." The entire assemblage are asked to join in the singing.

O God, our Help in ages past, Our Hope for years to come, Our Shelter from the stormy blast, And our eternal Home! Under the shadow of Thy throne Thy Saints have dwelt secure; Sufficent is Thine arm alone, And our defence is sure.

Before the hills in order stood, Or earth received her frame, From everlasting Thou art God To endless years the same. A thousand ages in Thy sight Are like an evening song; Short as the watch that ends the night Before the rising sun: Time like an ever-rolling stream, Thy Sails have dwelt secure; They fly forgotten, as a dream Dies at the opening day.

O God, our Help in ages past, Our Hope for years to come, Be Thou our Guard while troubles last, And our eternal Home! Amen. 12.15 p.m. C.L.B. Band plays the "Dead March in Saul" while wreaths (Official only) are being placed on the Memorial. At this period a wreath from one of the most beloved Mothers of our Dead will also be placed on the Memorial.

12.30 p.m. Firing Party will fire three volleys. 12.35 p.m. TWO MINUTES' SILENCE IN MEMORY OF OUR DEAD.

12.37 p.m. Last Post sounded by massed Buglers. 12.40 p.m. His Excellency Sir William Allardice, K.C.M.G., delivers the Panegyric. 12.50 p.m. Hallelujah Chorus (C.C.C. Band). 1.00 p.m. War Veterans and Brigades reform and March Past, en route to Government House. Colour Party will then move of parade, War Veterans will be dismissed and Brigades will move to their respective Headquarters independently.

Delivery of Wreaths. Permission has been granted to use the room on the ground floor of Synod Hall for the purpose of receiving Wreaths on the day preceding the Ceremony and at any time subsequent to the commencement of the Services. All those desirous of availing of this arrangement can have their wreaths addressed to Synod Hall during the afternoon, where they will be looked after and delivered to the wreath bearers immediately prior to the Ceremony.

Excellent Points of Observation For the General Public. It is obvious that certain spaces in the immediate vicinity of the Sergeant's Monument (the scene of the Ceremony) will have to be enclosed and reserved for the Next-of-Kin, etc. It is therefore suggested that advantage be taken of the high ground on Garrison Hill and the space in Mullaly Park. Experience has shown that both those points command a very good view of the Ceremonies.

Notice to Veterans. The Committee in charge of the Memorial Day Ceremonies (1923) has put forward every effort for a whole hearted observance of Memorial Day, which have now assumed a National aspect. You, as ex-Service men, are expected to turn out on parade on this day and show individually the respect that is due your Fallen Comrades. It does not matter whether you are in possession of a uniform or not; what matters most is your presence with the Veterans at the Memorial Ceremonies. If you have medals or decorations, they should be worn.

Flags Half Mast. It is hoped that all flags will be down, as heretofore, at half mast until 1 p.m. on Memorial Day. The Colours. Citizens are asked to remember what the Colours of the Regiment represent. They should show all the honour and respect which are due, by removing their head dress when the Colours pass.

Hospital Patients and Disabled Men. The Newfoundland Motor Association Members have once again undertaken to provide transportation for the Hospital patients at the Sanatorium, Sudbury Military Hospital and elsewhere. Transportation may be provided for badly disabled men residing in private houses, if application for same is made at the G.W.V.A. Office. It is hoped to have all the above in the enclosure reserved for them at 11.30 a.m.

Enclosures and Entrances. 11.15 a.m. School Children—The enclosure immediately in front of the B.I.S. Hall will be opened for the School Children and their Guardians. Entrance from Queen's Rd. and Garrison Hill. 11.30 a.m. Hospital Patients, etc.—This enclosure is immediately west of the monumental curb. Chairs will be provided, so as to eliminate discomfort as far as possible. 11.45 a.m. The Next-of-Kin—This enclosure is the most conveniently situated space available, and may be entered through the roped path-way from Western end of Queen's Road, Eastern end of Queen's Road or from Bond Street.

12 Noon Public Officials enter from Eastern end of Queen's Rd. or through roped path-way. Society Representatives come from Western end of Queen's Road through roped path-way or from Bond Street. Boy Scouts enter from the Western end of Queen's Road, also Garrison Hill. Old Comrades enter from Western end of Queen's Road. Brigades enter from Western end of Queen's Road, also Garrison Hill.

Bands take up positions allocated immediately after termination of Church Services excepting M.G.B. Band who will move to the enclosure in front of B.I.S. Hall. Sign posts will be placed at the entrance to the various enclosures so as to facilitate their location. It is a matter of great satisfaction to the Committee in charge, to know that it is assured of the goodwill and co-operation of all classes of the community in its efforts to maintain a whole hearted observance of Memorial Day, and it is hoped that every available citizen will be in attendance at the Memorial Day Ceremonies of 1923.
