BIG SUNDAY SCHOOL CAMPAIGN THIS YEAR

Four of Six Weeks Throughout The Province With Twenty-five Conventions-School at Banff

Under the auspices of the Alberta nday School Association, a tour of ne province extending over six weeks is to begin July 5. The announcemen was made yesterday afternoon by H. F. Kenny, general secretary, who is in the city. During the first five weeks twenty-five conventions will be held, and during the sixth week, from Aug. 7 to 12, a summer school will be conducted at Banff.

At this school, school methods will be taught by Miss Helen Paik of Winnipeg, a teacher in the Normal school there, who is a specialist on elementary work. Prof. L. L. Henry of Chicago will come to take charge of the musical part of the work. The tour will start at Medicine Hat, going down the Crow's Nest line up the Macleod branch and to Calgary, the convention being held here Sunday and Monday, July 17 and 18.

From here the tour will be continued north to Edmonton and thence west along the C. N. R. Stope will be made at Daysland and then at Wetaskiwin, Ponoka, Stettler, Red Deer and Olds.
