CALGARY WOMAN TAKES HER LIFE AT NELSON, B.C.

Mrs. Coral Lutzgus Drinks
Carbolic During Interview
With Nelson Chief of
Police

Nelson, B.C., Oct. 16.—Mrs. Coral Lutzgus of Calgary, committed suicide in Nelson this evening by drinking the greater part of three ounces of carbolic acid. She came to Nelson September 4th from Calgary with a man who gives the name of J. Connor. Connor's wife, followed, reaching here some days ago. There was a reconciliation between him and his wife and Mrs. Lutzgus followed two days later by her to Nelson, at which time she took place which caused a complaint to be laid with the police.

Chief of Police Long was remonstrating with Mrs. Lutzgus, who had promised to leave the city, a few minutes before she took the poison. She turned away from him, walked to the other side of the room and with her back turned lifted the bottle of carbolic acid to her lips.

Mrs. Lutzgus was 22 years of age and had two children. Her husband, she stated, deserted her in Calgary. Her father, C. Leader, and a brother, both commercial travelers, live in Calgary, and have been notified through the Calgary police.

TOO MUCH INTERNAL POLITICS IN RUSSIA

The Russian People Were
Not Thinking of a
German Attack

Petrograd, Oct. 16.—The landing of German troops on Oesel Island could have been averted only by risking battle under unfavorable conditions which might have resulted in the opening of the Gulf of Finland to the enemy. Admiral Vessovsky, minister of marine, said today, the blow is a hard one to Russia, but the Russian fleet apparently was in no position to hinder the Germans.

"Since March," the admiral said, "I have several times drawn attention to the possibility of such a blow and I also discussed the situation with Premier Kerevsky, but no one paid attention to the government's warning. Although we are at war our political differences have been given first place in the minds of the people. The Germans take this into account and events show that they have been able to take full advantage of it."

German naval power is four times greater than that of Russia, the admiral continued. "The naval force in the Gulf of Riga did everything possible to prevent a landing of the Germans and will continue to carry out all orders of the minister of marine."

The minister sees no immediate danger of a German attempt to enter the Gulf of Finland. He expresses the belief that owing to the lateness of the season the German operations will be localized.

The Petrograd council of workmen and soldiers' delegates has issued an appeal to the army and the fleet to

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ALL EUROPEAN COUNTRIES FACE SHORT RATIONS

Starvation Probable in Many
Lands; England Best Fed
Nation; Cold Weather
Will Bring Test

(By Arthur S. Deaper)

London, Oct. 16.—Europe is facing a winter of suffering, all the governments and peoples taking stock of their winter supplies. Not one European nation, neutral or belligerent, views the outlook with confidence or satisfaction. Europe is expected to have the shortest rations in her history. After midwinter many countries will suffer real privations and perhaps starvation.

The French food controllers have just given figures showing France's grain harvest for 1917 was the smallest in 50 years, and that to meet the deficit some 140 million bushels of cereals must be imported. In ordinary times France has eight million men to till her soil, but since August, 1914, three million of her best workers have been under arms. Recently a quarter of a million men were restored to the land, but France must depend largely upon her imports from America during the coming winter.

Italy has serious shortages. Italy also has her troubles. Minister Caspa, the Italian food controller, was recently succeeded by General Alfieri, who has made a considerable reputation as an organizer while under-secretary of war. Caspa's resignation followed disorders in Turin as a result of the scarcity of food. Italy has an elaborate system of food cards and regulations, but has failed to arrange for an ample supply of commodities. The result has been a serious shortage and much unrest. The change in the controlship has had the effect of quieting the unrest for the moment at least.

Russia's difficulties are the greatest in all Europe and need little description. Under the new government, with an expert business man at the head of transportation, there is some encouragement for a turn for the better. Russia has all the grain and meat she needs, but her broken down railways and dilapidated rolling stock must be repaired before distribution can be carried on properly.

England Limits Sugar Only

England probably is the best fed country in Europe today, though recently there have been signs of a shortage in some things, such as butter, bacon, eggs and margarine. This is chiefly due to the fact that the Scandinavian countries and Holland are shut off from supplies. Sugar is the only commodity of which the government limits the amount that may be bought by a single consumer. Though restaurants serve only a limited amount of meat and bread, the householders can eat as much as they wish. The amount that may be bought by a single consumer is approximately: Bread, eight ounces; potatoes, four ounces; meat, one ounce; butter and fat, twenty-three grams; flour, one and one-half ounces; and three eggs a week. Compared with the standard of living in the United States, England, for instance, represents starvation. And the real test of the Germans is bound to come this winter.

Detective Waugh, of the provincial police, Monday arrested Max Hammill near Trochu, and Tuesday morning he was fined \$200 and costs for selling liquor illegally, after pleading guilty to the charge. According to the provincial police, Hammill, who resided in the Samis block until a day or so ago, is connected with the Mortimer case, it being alleged that he sold a bottle of liquor to Mortimer the evening his horse ran away, when Mrs. Pope, of Blackie, was killed, about six miles from the city on the Macleod trail.

Hammill left the city immediately he heard of the accident, but the police obtained the information that he had sold Mortimer a bottle of liquor and a warrant was issued for his arrest.

IRON ORE SHIPMENTS Falling Off of Six Million Tons in Superior District.

Duluth, Oct. 16.—Iron ore shipments from Lake Superior district will show a falling off of 6,000,000 tons for the season from last year's record of more than 85,000,000 tons. It is authoritatively predicted with a diversion of shipping from ore to grain, an expected cutting down of shipments by operators.
