NOTES.

—Hon. Edward Blake will return to Canada in August.
—The City Council of Toronto have repealed the early closing by-law.
—Winnipeg grain dealers are said to have cleared \$700,000 by the recent rise in wheat.
—Governor Hill of New York has signed the bill substituting death by electricity for hanging.
—Three lives were lost and great damage done to property by a cyclone in Ottawa last week.
—Cleveland and Thurman were unanimously nominated for President and Vice-President of the United States at the Democratic Convention held in St. Louis last week.
—Hon. Edward Blake will act as counsel to Hon. Oliver Mowat in the case of the Ontario Government against the Federal Government, which comes up before the Privy Council in England this week.
—The Dominion Cabinet has been reconstructed. Hon. G. E. Foster becomes Finance Minister in succession to Sir Charles Tupper; Mr. Chas. H. Tupper is made Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and ex-Lt. Gov. Dewdney takes the portfolio of Minister of the Interior.
—The Senate, by a recent vote, only allow search to be made for liquor in Scott Act counties in the daytime, but decided it was quite proper to give Customs officials the power to break into the premises of merchants in search of smuggled or undervalued goods at any time in the whole twenty-four hours.
—Canada has a couple more new knights, Chief Justice Galt and Dr. Daniel Wilson being the last to find favor in a certain quarter. This knight-hood business is becoming rather monotonous in this country.—Standard.
We are glad to see that Dr. Wilson has refused the bauble, being content with his present well earned honors.
—Nearly the whole of Friday's session of the Niagara Conference of the Methodist church was again taken up with the case of the Rev. Mr. Longley, who made a long and affecting statement, confessing his deep penitence for his error and pleading for mercy. The Toronto district resolution for his expulsion was rejected, there being only twelve votes for it, and by a vote of 56 to 40 a resolution was carried suspending him from the ministry for one year.

NOTHING IN IT.—The heirs of the Teetzel estate, resident in St. Thomas and vicinity, who recently subscribed a fund and sent Mr. James Teetzel to Germany to investigate all the facts in connection with the untold millions which awaited claimants, on Saturday called Mr. Teetzel to return home. RAISE MORE ONIONS.—If our farmers would pay attention to growing onions they would find it very remunerative. It has been found almost impossible to obtain enough for culinary purposes during the past spring, and they have been worth at wholesale \$5 per hundred pounds. Onions are being imported from Egypt and Malta to supply the demand in Ontario. An acre will easily produce 100 bushels.

The Thistles played the return match with the Young Athletics in Atlantic Park, St. Thomas, on Saturday last, and were defeated by 12 to 14. The absence of some of the Thistles' best players and a number of foolish but costly errors gave the Athletics the victory. B. J. Schultz umpired satisfactorily to both sides. As this is a game for each club, another match will have to be played to decide the victors.

A HEARTLESS "JOKE".—Sunday morning Wm. Doyle was presented with a cigar by a friend. Later on in the day he concluded to have a smoke and accordingly lit the aforesaid cigar. Before proceeding far with the delicious weed it suddenly exploded, it having been filled with powder, severely burning Mr. Doyle's face. The perpetrator of such a cruel and heartless "joke" should be made an example of.

BRUTAL ASSAULT.—Mr. McPherson, brother of D. McPherson, Dutton, watchman at the crossing of the M. C. R. and G. T. R. about three miles east of St. Thomas, was murdered about 9 o'clock on Wednesday morning of last week by three tramps, who beat him until insensible, and after robbing him of his watch and other articles, threw his body into a pool of water. Mr. McPherson is recovering slowly. Several tramps have been arrested for the crime, but the guilty ones have not been captured as yet.

AN ANCIENT RELIC.—A correspondent of the Rodney Mercury says: A very ancient relic is to be seen partially buried on the farm of Mr. Philip Schlehauf. The stones are thirty inches in diameter and six inches thick. The lower one is concave, and the upper one is fitted to it. They were dressed to run with the sun, and were propelled by a bullock working a wooden lever. The origin of this and similar mills date back to the time of Abraham and Sarah, when dwelling in tents near Padanaram. The stones are well-worn, but they seem to have suited the times, and the simple-minded miller who last used them.

REMEMBER THIS.—The latest postal laws are such that newspaper publishers can arrest any one for fraud who takes a paper and refuses to pay for it. Under the law the man who allows his subscription to run along for some time unpaid, or takes three papers from the post-office, and then orders the postmaster to mark it "refused," and has a notice sent notifying the publisher, makes himself liable to arrest and fine same as for theft.

THE NEWEST SWINDLE.—A new swindle has been developed, and several farmers have already been bitten. To operate requires a shrewd man and a second or third rate horse. The man in this instance is particularly shrewd, and the horse worth \$50 or \$60. The confidence man informs himself accurately regarding the farmer upon whom he intends to call, takes from a devious source some good jokes that are worked off at the expense of one member or another, is very slick all round and generally succeeds in convincing the honest farmer that he's a genial fellow and all right. Through these traits of character the fellow gets his board and lodging free of charge, and the host that gets off with no heavier loss is in great luck. After he has circulated about in one neighborhood long enough to become popular and solid, he drops in on the one selected as his victim. He has with him a note purporting to be made by a neighboring farmer. It is for \$50 and the fellow wants to dispose of it. He doesn't expect to be in that section soon again and besides has need of ready money. He gets \$40 for the paper if he can, but occasionally drops down to \$35. This is a very enticing snare, and the sale is usually made in short order. It is invariably the case that a man on that section galling away to some other field of enterprise. The note is a forgery and the victim is out the cash invested. The trick has caught several of the farmers and the presumption is that the horse is still going, as all attempts to capture its owner have thus far been unsuccessful.
