WHY RECIPROCITY MUST TRIUMPH The revival of the discussion of the best means to extend foreign trade has resulted in bringing out in a marked degree the popularity of the reciprocity movement. We can scarcely find a public man or a newspaper on either side of the line that is openlý opposed to reciprocity, but we discover many who, in the interest of the monopolies, are covertly trying to make establishment of reciprocity - the natural extension of international trade-as difficult as possible. We would rather have such men open enemies. As professed friends of reciprocity, while ready to stab as opportunity offers, they can retard the prog-ress of the movement in favor of freedom to trade, though they cannot prevent its final

Prof. Goldwin [Smith, president of the ercial Union Club, which held its meeting in Toronto last night, set forth the remarkable progress which the movement in favor of unrestricted re-ciprocity had made since members of the club, but a year or two ago, systematically set about convincing the people of the enormous benefits to be derived from freedom to buy and sell with our neighbors in the United States. He freely admitted at the McKinley Bill will be a great dis-ter. "It will," Prof. Smith continued, "be felt much more by our farmers than by those who, having nothing personally to lose by it, can afford to receive it with trumpet notes of patriotic defiance. 
