The Conveyance Was Not Frandulent.

In the case of Des Rosiers vs. Wallace, at Osgoode Hall, Toronto, judgment was given upon appeal by the plaintiff from the judgment of Ferguson, J., at the trial at London, dismissing the action, which was brought to setasdie a conveyance of a house and lot in the city of London by the defendant Robert Wallace to the defendant Arthur Wallace as frandulent and void against creditors, the action being brought in the name of the plaintiff (assignee for creditors) by the Bank of London, which have a judgment against the defendant Robert Wallace. VOICES OF THE PEOPLE.

Protection from Fire in Threshing.

To the Editor of the Western Adventisen:
I have been informed from a source that is at once authoritative and reliable, that within the last five years the insurance companies of this Province have been taxed to the extent of \$200,000 to pay for farm property destroyed through fires kindled by sparks from steam engines used in threshing. This sum, large as it is, does not probably represent more than half the amount of the loss, as such property is not insured for a sum nearly equal to its full value.

The pressure thus put upon the insurance ompanies has been of so severe a nature hat some of them have been constrained place a higher rate on risks for farm uildings where steam engines are used in

threshing.

The difficulty has at last been met by the introduction of a "igack," which is placed near the barn door, and which connects with the engine by means of a rope, inso-much that the engine may be placed at any desired distance from the barn, and also at any desired angle from the same that may be found convenient. Two trials were made at our barn here

be found convenient.

Two trials were made at our barn here during the closing days of November with the Davidson jack or transmitter, which was this year invented in Guellin, and is now patented. In the first of those the engine was placed 265 feet distant from the barn door, and at a considerable angle to the line of the machine. Everything went well with the exception of a lack of speed, which was caused by having too small a flange-wheel attached to the wheel of the engine, which, by the way, is a 17-horse power one. When in its accustomed place, increased speed in secured through the shafting in the bars. In the second trial the engine was placed nearly at right angles with the jack and at a lower elevation. A flange wheel four feet in diameter was attached to that of the engine. The result of the trial was in every way satisfactory. A sufficiency of speed was obtained, and without any greater pressure of steam than when the engine is in its usual place, which is only 65 feet from the barn.

It is not for me to say what legislation should be adopted in this matter, but it is my province to appeal to the farmers of the entire Dominion, asking that they will give it their most careful consideration. If they refuse to employ a steam thresher which does not carry along with it some form of transmitter of power, the person threshing will then be connelled to furnish one.

The thresher will naturally be averse to this, owing first to the outlay in purchasing, and second because it gives him some 609 or 700 pounds additional to carry from place to place. On the assumption that he is not overpaid at present, he would be entitled to some consideration at the hands of the farmer for this additional trouble. Fifty cents additional per day would pay for the jack in a single season. The jack, which rests on wheels, is drawn behind the machine in moving from place to place.

I feel safe in saying that when a transmitter is used an engine will do effective work at least 300 feet distant from the barn and when placed at any desired angle. It is, therefore, easily possible in the future to prevent the hard earnings of the farmer from going up in a regretful cloud of smoke, because of the fires enkindled by sparks from the engine.
