Elgin County Prisoners Live at 6 1/4 Cents a Day.

Prof. Fenton, O. A. C., is doing fairly well at his home in Guelph. Mrs. Hugh McIntyre, of Kilmartin, sold 30 acres of her farm to Neil Munro for \$800.

The quarterly report of Jailer Moore of the Elgin jail shows that the prisoners are fed for 6 1/4 cents per head a day.

The southeast quarter of lot No. 13, second concession of Howard township, sold under mortgage, was knocked down to Mr. Farquhar McKee for \$1,500.

There are from 147 to 150 students registered at the Ontario Agricultural College at present, a large number of them boarding out, there being no room at the college.

Mrs. Elizabeth Middleton died on Monday at the residence of Mr. Wm. Baydon, Exeter, Devonshire, who was in her 86th year, was taken ill of paralysis about a week previous to her death.

Miss Beatrice Kate Greenhill, daughter of the Windsor manager of the Merchants' Bank of Canada, died on Wednesday night of consumption. She was only 19 years of age. Interment at Galt.

About \$100,000 has been invested in buildings, principally private houses, in Guelph, this year. \$20,000 has been spent in permanent sidewalks, and there is now over 23 miles of these sidewalks in the city.

Henry Dwyer's slaughter house and barns at Alvinston were destroyed by fire Thursday morning. In the buildings was a large quantity of grain and feed, which was all destroyed. Loss about \$1,000; small insurance.

Mrs. Thomas Kerr died at her residence in Galt on Wednesday, aged 70 years. She was born in Scotland, and had lived in Galt for 45 years, being well known and highly respected in the community.

The Rev. C. A. Anderson, B.A., pastor of St. John's Church, Alvinston, and St. Mary's Church, Napier, who has been minister of the latter church for the past two years, having accepted a call to the Kingsville parish, will, on Sunday next, hold farewell services.

The T. H. and B. R. are asking a petition to the government for the bonus of \$2,000 per mile, which was once granted but not earned because the road was not completed in specified time.

Col. Guillot will ask permission from the government to increase the Twenty-first Fusiliers by the addition of another company. It is rumored that the War Office has granted Quartermaster Wigle will be given command of the new company.

At Brantford on Wednesday night a policeman found the window at the rear of James Broadbent's tailoring shop open, and discovered a burglar inside, whom he arrested. At the police court next morning John McKinlay, the burglar, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to six months in the Central.

While threshing on Mr. Brady's farm, near Harriston, the other day, Mr. James Broadbent's tailoring shop was hit on the forehead, just over the eye, with a flying cinder-bolt, inflicting a terrible gash. Had the missile struck him fairly, instead of on an angle, the result would undoubtedly have proved fatal.

While threshing near Harriston the other day, Jack French, who runs a steam threshing, and a number of the hands had a narrow escape. When the machine was running at full speed a stone, bound up in a sheaf, dropped the cylinder, causing a great crash. The concave above the cylinder then went in all directions, some of them sticking into the roof of the barn.

Mrs. Wm. Spears, of Etobicoke, was alighting from a buggy at the Princeton Methodist Church, and when she suddenly started forward, throwing Mrs. Spears to the ground. In her fall one limb was badly twisted, the hip being put out of joint, and three bones broken above the knee. The unfortunate woman fell under the buggy, the hind wheel passing over her.

Mr. Wm. Dillabough, of Bianshard (Downie townline), died the other day after two years' illness from lung troubles, in his 64th year. He had resided in Bianshard 35 years. He leaves a widow and four children—Mrs. Len Fulcher, St. Marys; Robert and David, in Manitoba; and Philip, in Ingersoll.

On Sunday last Rev. Mr. Sallery, in the Dublin Street Church, Guelph, remarked that a few Sundays ago there were about 600 persons present, and the plate collected amounted to a few cents over \$2, and as this was made up mostly of five-cent pieces, only about 50 persons contributed, and over 500 gave nothing. Very likely half of that number could scrape up money enough to go to a baseball match, or the opera, or buy a bicycle, but they are determined to have a free gospel.

There will be a number of prominent speakers at the meetings.

Dr. Digby has entered an action against Messrs. E. A. Brown and J. A. Bain, of the Bain wagon works, for \$2,000 and damages. It seems that the doctor was a shareholder in the old company to this extent, and that when the amalgamation with the Massey-Harris Company took place he objected to it and wanted his capital back. This, the statement of chain says, was promised him, but was never forthcoming, hence the action. The statement of defense says that the shares are now at par value.—Brantford Courier.
