No Labor Candidate. The adjourned convention of delegates from the different trades and labor councils and ward workingmen's clubs was held in the Trades and Labor Hall last night, and was largely attended. Mr. H. B. Ashplant occupied the chair, and after a spirited debate, in which nearly every delegate had a say, it was moved by Mr. Joseph T. Marks, the candidate mentioned at the last conventhe candidate mentioned at the last convention, that a candidate be not nominated, and that the money subscribed for election purposes be used to perfect the work of organizing and spreading ward legislative clubs. This motion was adopted by a vote of 52 to 17. It was afterwards made unanimous. Mr. Marks addressed the convention, and said that addressed the convention, and said that he was more confident for the cause of labor after such a vote than he was before. It would show the citizens that the labor party could think and deliberate and not be carried away by enthusiasm, and that they were getting ready so that when the time came labor would strike to win. The unions, he said, were without exception ready to indorse the nomibut thought the time called nation, for a more thorough organization. After the convention it was resolved to devise plans to supply the Industrial Banner free to every house in the city, and Messrs. Pedden, Cummings, King, Johnston and Taylor were appointed to wait on the different trades councils in regard to the matter. A committee was also appointed to draft a platform to submit to the candidates at the coming election. It was decided to organize a legislative club in ward 2 on April 30 at Sherwood Hall. The convention adjourned for four weeks. The Troublesome Breakwater.

The London West breakwater, which since its construction has been a continual source of trouble to the village, it now attracting the attention of the Real Estate Owners' Association, which includes a number of London West's leading landlords. At the regular meeting of that body last night, the question was threshed out at some length, Mr. F. A. Jones pronouncing the breakwater in a very bad state of repair, while Mr. Wm. Peters, with an eye to beauty, suggested that trees be planted along the same. Mr. C. Jones strongly advocated the keeping of the breakwater in a thorough state 'of repair, as it would be a decided advantage. He also favored the forwarding of a request for assistance to the Ontario Government. Some of the

Reeve Macdonald wrote stating it was his belief that the association would be of great value to the council by assisting to carry on the affairs of the village in a proper and economical manner.
