No Labor Candidate.

The adjourned convention of delegates
from the different trades and labor councils
and ward workingmen's clubs was held in
the Trades and Labor Hall last night, and
was largely attended. Mr. H. B. Ashplant
occupied the chair, and after a spirited de-
bate, in which nearly every delegate had
a say, it was moved by Mr. Joseph T. Marks,
the candidate mentioned at the last conven-
tion, that a candidate be not nominated,
and that the money subscribed for elec-
tion purposes be used to perfect the
work of organizing and spreading
ward legislative clubs. This motion was
adopted by a vote of 52 to 17. It was
afterwards made unanimous. Mr. Marks
addressed the convention, and said that
he was more confident for the cause of
labor after such a vote than he was before.
It would show the citizens that the labor
party could think and deliberate and not
be carried away by enthusiasm, and that
they were getting ready so that when the
time came labor would strike to win. The
meeting, he said, was without excep-
tion, ready to endorse the nomination,
but thought the time called for a more
thorough organization. After the convention
it was resolved to supply the Industrial
Banner free to every house in the city, and
Messrs. Pedden, Cummings, King, John-
son and Taylor were appointed to wait on
the different trades councils in regard to
the matter. A committee was also ap-
pointed to draft a platform to submit to
the candidates at the coming election. It
was decided to organize a legislative club in
ward 2 on April 30 at Sherwood Hall. The
convention adjourned for four weeks.

between two of the members. One of

about ten degrees to the southwest of it.—Mr. C. B. Smith, of London West, was
driving home about noon yesterday, when
turning the corner of the Wharfedale
road and Mount Pleasant avenue a wheel
on the wagon broke. Mrs. Smith was
thrown out but escaped uninjured.—At the April session of the Ontario Land
Surveyors' Board of Examiners, among the
successful candidates for preliminary ex-
amination were: W. B. Ford, London; W.
A. McLean, St. Thomas, and J. J. New-
man, Windsor. Mr. Charles Court Fair-
child, of Bradford, passed his final ex-
amination, and was sworn in.—The annual examination of the young
Methodist preachers of the London Confer-
ence is taking place at Strathroy this week.
The sessions began on Tuesday, and will
probably not close until Thursday evening.
There is quite a large class of them. Among
the examiners are Revs. B. Clement, J. B.
Ainslie and J. B. Gundy, of this city. On
Thursday evening a public meeting will be
held, when certificates will be presented to
the successful applicants, and addresses
will be given by Rev. Messrs. W. J. Ford,
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forwarding of a request for assistance to

village in a proper and economical manner.
The publishing of the auditors' statement
was promised as soon as possible. The
council will be invited to attend the meet-
ings of the association and receive "point-
ers" on economy. A list of non-desirable
tenants will be furnished for members
only, and the action of the school board in
granting the use of a room in the school to
the council for weekly meetings was ap-
proved of.

have another play-house, and the capitalist
who is behind the scheme is to erect it for
the purpose of providing a permanent home
for George Grossmith, the entertainer.
The new theater, it is expected, will be
ready for occupancy some time next
winter. It will be devoted to satirical
light operas, in which Mr. Grossmith's
long services won an enviable English repu-
tation. The scene for one opera, at least,
will be supplied by Reginald De Kovan,
while Mr. Grossmith himself will supply
the music for several others. Arthur Law,

tribute one book. In the fall Mr. Gros-
smith will bring his company over here and
present several of his new operas prior to
the opening of his London theater.
