THE NORTHWEST HARVEST.

Portage la Prairie, Man., Aug. 20.—The
what harvest on Portage Plains is one week
behind last year and it is about the same
elsewhere in the province, except round
Gretina, where 90 per cent is already cut.
Only about 10 per cent of the wheat is cut
here now but by Saturday night, the 24th,
over 75 per cent, will be cut if the present
fine weather continues. The weather is
very favorable for ripening, no strong or hot
winds. The proportion of grain lodged is
very small and all can be cut with care.
There has been no frost whatever.
Calgary N. W. T., reports 10 days to
harvest, Regina says just commencing, while
Prince Albert has not begun. All the
reports are favorable.
