To the Editor of the Adventisers:

It has just come to my notice that in your paper of the 28th inst., headed "Knecks is Out," appears the following: "Was the special meeting of the council, at which the new street railway company's proposition was accepted, illegal or not? Ald. Jeffery says it was not legal because it was called for an entirely different purpose. And it has since transpired that the meeting was illegal, but from a totally different reason than he sets forth."

Wheever wrote the above must be devoid of common sense. In my letter to you of the 24th inst., I stated that the proceedings at the special meeting of the City

of the 24th inst., I stated that the proceedings at the special meeting of the City Council held on Thursday evening, 20th inst., were illegal because the meeting was called to discuss Port Stanley Rallway matters and instead the matter of the electric street railway was discussed and dealt with. I now affirm that I was correct, and further say that the city solicitor in his letter states that the proceedings were illegal for the reasons that I have stated. 
