The people of Durham had enjoyed the privilege of hearing the principles of Liberalism discussed by four ministers of the crown—Sir Whifrid Laurier, pre-mier of the Dominion; Hon. Wm. Mu-lock, postmaster-general; Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, and Hon. John Dryden, minister of agriculture for Ontario. The premier's speech rang clear with a message of hope and prosperity for the future of Canada, and with a practical imperialism which found a quick response in the hearts


