dieton dragged her anchors at Hastings, and is ashore at Auld's Cove. The schooner John Halliday, with coal, is ashore and full of water between Canoe and Hastings. The schooner P. Walsh dragged and is ashore at Cape Porcupine. The schooner Onora is stranded at Bayfield. It had position. The schooners E. D. Myra and Mabou, for Halifax and Avon, are ashore in the straits. The schooner Glenora is reported cut down in a collision.

At Canoe the storm did a great deal of damage to shipping, fishing boats, houses and barns. The wind on Thursday afternoon became a hurricane. The American schooner Wetherell, was driven over the shoal in Canoe harbor and had a narrow escape. The Canoe schooner Acadia went ashore on White's Point, but managed to get off, leaving badly. The schooner Ocean Belle is sunk in Glasgow harbor.

The American schooner Mystery arrived from the Banks, reporting one man lost. The schooner Senator Salisbury also came in, having lost everything from her deck.

St. Johns, Nfld., Oct. 15.—The steamer Kate, which has just visited Cumberland Inlet with supplies for the American whaling station there, reports that nothing has been heard from the steamer Windward. Hope of her return this fall is now practically abandoned.

MR. KRUGER'S INTENTIONS

He Is Likely to Leave South Africa for Good.

Lord Roberts Hopes the Orange River Colonials Will Stay Till the War Is Ended.

London, Oct. 15.—The Telegraph's correspondent in Lorenzo Marquez cables an interview had between him and ex-President Kruger's grandson, Eloff, who accompanies his grandfather to Europe. He said he did not think Kruger intended to return to South Africa. He did not suppose the British would allow him to land, if he did return. He denied his grandfather had gone on board the Dutch cruiser Gelderland, which does not sail before next Thursday. When the Dutch embassy he would do so openly, under the auspices of the governor of Lorenzo Marquez.

THE COLONIAL VOLUNTEERS.

Cape Town, Oct. 15.—The mayor has received a telegram from Gen. Roberts announcing that the colonial volunteers who have been on active service north of the Orange River may return home as soon as possible after the war. Gen. Roberts expresses the hope, however, that many of the volunteers will remain in the field until the termination of the war, and says that their leaving now will have the worst possible effect.

BUSHMEN DEFEAT BOERS.

A dispatch from Mafeking yesterday states that the Australian bushmen had an engagement on Friday at Letpoort, two miles from Malmalm, with a force of Boers, who for a considerable time had been strongly entrenched in the kopjes northeast of Malmalm. The British loss was two wounded. The Boers lost seven dead on the field.
