Manila, Oct. 15.-Advices received here from Iloilo, Island of Panay, under date of Friday, Oct. 12, say that Com-pany D, of the 26th United States Volunteer Infantry, was attacked on the previous day by a force of Tagalogs in Northern Panay. The enemy lost 20 men killed and 40 wounded, while the Americans had two men wounded. Iwenty-two prisoners and 12 rifles and a quantity of ammunition were captured. The Tagalogs were from the Island of Luzon.
