A Warm Contest for Secretaryship Of No 2 Committee of the Council

City Clerk Baker Was Appointed Last Night—Matter of Salary Was Not Decided.

Quite a number of citizens gathered at the city hall last night under the impression that the appointment of a fire chief would take place. All were disappointed, as the appointment was not mentioned, and after a very brief session the council meeting broke up.

Ald. Ferguson was absent, and Ald. Stevenson was late in arriving. What promised to be a lively row developed over the appointment of City Clerk Baker to be secretary of No. 2 committee in place of Assistant City Engineer Kirkpatrick.

In bringing in his report, Ald. Gerry, chairman of No. 2 committee, recommended that a bylaw be introduced to appoint Assistant City Engineer Kirkpatrick to be secretary of No. 2 committee in place of the assistant city treasurer.

Ald. Beattie moved in amendment that City Clerk Baker be appointed to do the work. The motion was supported by Ald. Armstrong.

Ald. Beattie took strong exception and said that what he did respect to Ald. Armstrong he was sorry that in his old age he had not awakened to the fact before that the city clerk could do the work.

The amendment was put and a tie vote resulted. Mayor Stevely broke the tie by voting in favor of the amendment. The vote was as follows: For City Clerk Baker—Aldermen Parsons, Booth, Beattie, Greenlee and Armstrong.

For Assistant Engineer Kirkpatrick—Aldermen Rose, Gerry, Stewart, Saunders and Moorhead.

Ald. Saunders moved that the reading of the bylaw confirm the motion made over for two weeks, as the matter as to whether the clerk should or should not receive any extra salary for doing the work had not been settled. This motion carried.

Street Car Steps. No. 1 committee, in their report, referred to the council for action the communication of the Ontario, railway and municipal board re the date of hearing application to fix the height of street car steps.

The question will come up before the board in London, on Sept. 24, and it was unanimously agreed that the city should be represented at the meeting. Several of the aldermen stated that many complaints were being made regarding the height of the steps on the street cars.

Ottawa Avenue Derail. Ald. Booth moved, seconded by Ald. Rose, that where the board of railway commissioners of Canada in 1907, ordered the London Street Railway to place their derails at the London and Port Stanley Railway track, and

whereas on certain representations of the London Street Railway in 1907 the said board of railway commissioners granted consent to the placing of said derails 25 feet instead of 75 feet from the intersections, as ordered in 1904, and whereas the London and Port Stanley Railway board in 1907, by resolution, opposed the granting of the petition of the London Street Railway and notified the said board of railway commissioners of their opposition, and whereas the street cars are now operated both ways on the Ottawa Avenue belt; be it resolved that the board of railway commissioners of Canada be petitioned to rescind order of 1907 permitting the placing of the said derails 25 feet from the intersection. Carried.

Mayor Stevely suggested that a committee from the council meet the street railway company and go into the matter. Ald. Booth strongly disapproved, saying it was a matter to be dealt with by the railway and the railway commission.

Tuberculosis Case. Canon Dwyer Hague wrote re James Smith, that Mrs. McKnight, with whom he has been boarding, has been put to considerable expense and trouble in caring for him, and Canon Hague asked that the city council remunerate her. No. 1.

The report of the Fire Underwriters' Association re high pressure schemes for London was referred to No. 3 committee.

In the matter of granting \$5,000 for five years to the Western University, Ald. Armstrong's motion, that No. 1 committee confer with board of governors and arrange the matter, carried.

Opening Up a Street. City Clerk Baker wrote stating that on Friday last Messrs. Logan and Smith, ratepayers on Dufferin avenue, between English and Ontario streets, had intervened and him re the payment of \$700 voted by the council to the residents of Dufferin avenue for opening that portion of the street. Messrs. Logan and Smith interviewed No. 2 committee, and on their promise to refund the sum of \$700 paid the sum to certain parties for land.

The residents of Southgate and Windsor avenues petitioned for an electric light at that corner. No. 3.

A petition from the residents on the north side of Grand avenue, east of Carfrae street, for a cement sidewalk was referred to No. 2 committee.

Mr. J. F. Faulstich wrote that John Crockett had instructed him to demand \$40 from the city for work done on Oxford street bridge. No. 2.

Mr. T. F. Kingsmill wrote asking that he be exempted from taxes on the Albert street sewer as he is at present using a sewer on Ridout street, on which he pays taxes. No. 2.

Professor of Classics for the Western
Dr. K. P. R. Neville, associate professor of classics in the State University of Illinois, has been selected to fill the vacant chair of classics in Western University.

Dr. Neville is a Canadian, a graduate of Queen's University, who took his B.A. degree at Cornell University, and his M.A. at Harvard and the Ph.D. at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York.

VETERANS ASK FOR CHANGES
Howard Gould's Wife Demands \$120,000 Per Year.

New York, Sept. 21.—Mrs. Katherine Clemmons Gould, who is suing Howard Gould for divorce, today applied through counsel to Justice Gleason for an order compelling Mr. Gould to pay her \$120,000 a year alimony, and \$15,000 for her counsel fees. After a hearing the justice adjourned the argument until Oct. 1, at the request of Cornelius Sullivan, counsel for Mr. Gould. Mr. Sullivan said he must have more time to examine the papers in the case. Immediately following the temporary disposition of this action, the case of Helen Kelly Gould against Frank J. Gould for absolute divorce was called on for judgment. The case was heard in court room. The proceedings in this case were brief, the court merely adjourned Oct. 2 as the date for a hearing on the motion.

WAINWRIGHT'S PROGRESS
Only a Few Weeks Old, But Is An Important Centre.

Wainwright, Alta., Sept. 21.—Situated in one of the most fertile farming districts of Western Canada, in what is known as the famous Battle River Valley, just a short distance east of the Battle River, and upon the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, is the town of Wainwright. This town is the first divisional point east of Edmonton, and although only a few weeks old, bids fair to be one of the best towns in the west.

Wainwright has already five general stores, two hardware stores, three lumber yards, all of which are of undoubted standing, and several other business houses of merit to a town of many thousands of people. The town has been carefully selected and is beautifully situated. The surrounding country is well settled with settlers, chiefly Canadian and American.

Both the Dominion Government and the Grand Trunk Pacific have lent their efforts toward building up what town, the former by establishing what will in a very short time be Canada's greatest national park, just to the southwest of the town. It will be known throughout the world as Canada's great buffalo reserve. The Grand Trunk Pacific has commissioned erection of a 12-stall roundhouse and
