TODAY'S MARKET WAS UNUSUALLY SMALL

Farmers Holding Their Produce Back For the Holiday Market.

The attendance at the market today was not as large as is usually the case on Tuesdays on account of t e farmers May holding back their produce until Thursday, when the big market of the week will be held. A fairly large attendance is expected on Friday, as there will be no market on Saturday, Victoria Day. Some fifteen to twenty loads of he Some afteen to twenty loads of hay were sold during the day, but the prices were lower, and the demand dull on account of the general poor quality of the offerings. The large amount of poor hay was caused by the quick ripening of the hay during the hot spell last summer. The prices today ranged from \$10 to \$11.50 per ton, but the highest price was paid in but ope or two cases, and the average prices were about \$11 and \$11 25

demand was fairly keen.
The demand for oats was keen, but there were no changes in the prices, which ranged from \$1 08 to \$1 13 per cwt. Only five or six loads were sold. The demand for dressed hogs was also keen, and there was a small advance in the prices. The average selling price was \$13.00 per cwt., and in several cases the price was as high as \$13.25 per cwt.
