ARISTIDE FILIATREAULT HAD CHECKERED CAREFR

Fanious French-Canadian Newspaperman Is Dead at Montreal.

[Canadian Press.]

Montreal, Dec. 5. - Mr. Aristide Filiatreault, journalist, printer, litterateur, and general all-round agitator among French-Canadian newspapermen, died yesterday, leaving a singularly interesting record behind him.

He was employed in several Toronto newspaper offices, such as the Mail and Empire and the World, and later with the Montreal Gazette. He was night foreman in the Mail office when Goldwin Smith was writing his furious articles against the Society of Jesus, during the famous equal rights agitation throughout the Dominion, because of Sir John Macdonald's refusal to disallow the Jesuits' estates act introduced by the then premier, Mercier, and adopted by the Quebec Legisla-

Soon after this the late Mr. Filia treault returned to his native city and started a number of ventures, the most famous of which was Le Canada Revue, a weekly publication.


