WINDSOR, Sept. 23 .- Acting on the ecommendation of Hon. W. E. Raney, attorney general, the provincial cabinet has passed an order-in-council superseding Judge George Smith on the Windsor police commission by Judge J. J. Coughlin. Local officials were notified of the change today.

Judge Smith was appointed to the board of police commissioners after the death of Judge John O. Dromgole, April 25, 1919.
