Mr. and Mrs. Robert Paterson Celebrate Their Diamond Jubilee.

SIXTY BLOOD RELATIVES CONGRATULATE THEM

Bride and Groom Came To Canada From Scotland in 1853.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Paterson of Thorndale on September 20 celebrated their diamond wedding. They are indeed a remarkable "young-old" couple. Happy is their lot to be found today as the same generous, considerate and kindly helpmates for each other and to have carried this great blessing down throughout all these years, from the day when they were joined "until death do us part."

And it was a great comfort, besides a remarkable fact, that on this occasion, Mr. and Mrs. Paterson were surrounded by their children and friends. Not once in all these years has the hand of death intervened to mar the happiness of this great family, and on the day of the diamond wedding the family was still complete.

Sixty Relatives Present.
Ten years ago Mr. and Mrs. Paterson celebrated their golden wedding. This great event brought much consolation and comfort to the family and their wide circle of friends. There was a large gathering then, but the diamond wedding was entered into with even greater spirit and zest. When the stage was ready, Mr. and Mrs. Paterson were surrounded by sixty blood relations and friends. They came from Toronto, Hamilton, Brantford, Ingersoll, Stratford, St. Marys, London, Detroit, Des Moines and Thamesford.

There were many remarkable features of the celebration. One of these was the presence of the bridesmaid, who supported Mrs. Paterson on her wedding day. Mrs. Thomas Hogg, Others were some of the old ministers of churches which the family attended in the days when they, with others, fought the pioneer's fight of Western Ontario. And during the day evidence was given that the religious spirit of the Paterson family is not something picked up just to comfort them in their old age. Instead it has been a part of their very being, up hill and down, from the days when they first reached the shores of Canada.

First School.
The Paterson family came to Canada from Banffshire, Scotland, in 1853, and settled on the Governor's road, near

Thorndale, the present day pastor of Mr. and Mrs. Paterson Sen.

To mark the event, Walter S. Paterson, one of the sons, on behalf of the family presented the parents with a substantial sum of money, and as a culminating number, the father and eldest daughter, with the son George as accompanist, rendered the same hymns which they had sung at the golden wedding celebration.

With the official honors of the occasion over, restraint was cast to the four winds and a great harmonious family spent a pleasant time in conversation and later partook of a dainty lunch.

Mr. Paterson is fond of music, in fact one of his chief delights is to take down his violin in the quiet hours of the evening and play.

What kind of music? Well, first of all, to use Mr. Paterson's own words, "A few of the grand old hymns," but if there happens to be those around who call for anything else, Mr. Paterson turns to the tuneless lays of Bonnie Scotland, and plays them with all the love and devotion that a real Scot feels for the land of his fathers.

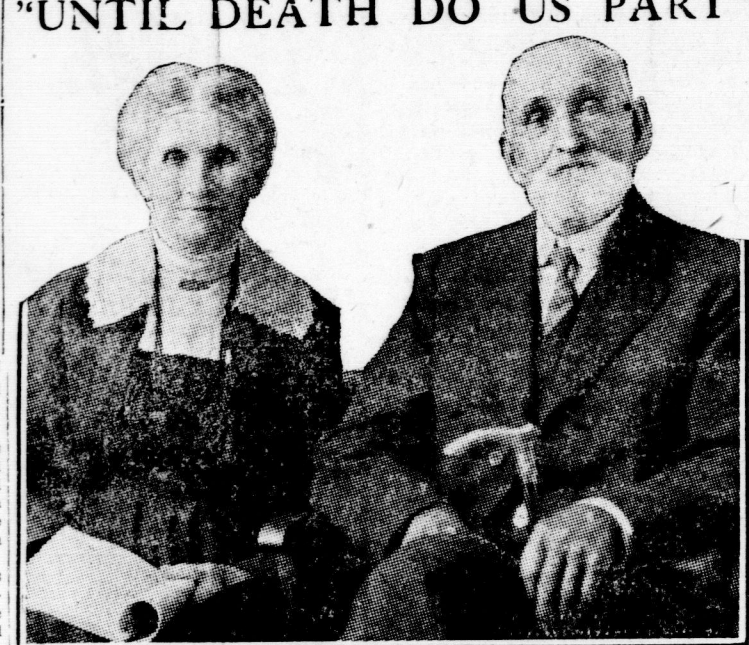

Thamesford. Their advent brought about a great change in the life of the community. Up to that time the matter of a school, or a Sabbath school, had never been thought of. Mr. Paterson took a hand and stirred up interest in a school, showing the way by donating a corner on his farm as a building site. Mrs. Vining was the first teacher, and being a "faithful one," as Mr. Paterson put it, she at once established a Sabbath school. For years Mr. Paterson was its superintendent.

Mrs. W. A. Woods outlined the gathering of the history of the pioneer days of the family in Canada, and then Rev. Mr. Galbraith, pastor of the church at which the family worshipped for years, followed. He spoke kindly of the early days in the Kirk, and paid tribute to the efforts of Mr. Paterson as an elder. The program was varied with instrumentals, while Misses Esther and Helen McMillan rendered songs. Rev. Mr. Thomson sang several Scotch numbers. T. L. Wood, Brantford; Dr. McWilliams, London; Rev. Mr. Nickel, London, the latter having been with the oldest Paterson son, Thomas, in the building of the C. P. R. through Western Ontario, added tributes. As did also Rev. Mr. Kellum, Thorndale, the present day pastor of Mr. and Mrs. Paterson Sen.

WANTS DISPENSARIES FOR SALE OF LIQUOR
WINNIPEG, Man., Sept. 23.—A demand that the Provincial Government establish dispensaries for the sale of intoxicants for beverage purposes under permit will be made at the opening of the 1922 session of the Legislature, Col. William Grassie, president of the Moderation League of Manitoba, announced today.

Should the Legislature decline to pass the necessary legislation making provision for government liquor stores, the Moderation League will call upon the Government to exercise the initiative through a referendum measure.

BARES RELIEF GIVEN JOBLESS BRITISHERS
LONDON, Sept. 23.—(By Canadian Press Cable).—Right Hon. Winston Churchill, secretary of state for the colonies, today received two deputations from Dundee. To the first deputation, which dealt with the unemployment situation, the colonial secretary said that since the signing of the armistice the British Government had spent £105,000,000 in relief. This, he said, was unparalleled in any country in the world, and added that the situation in America now as regards unemployment was infinitely worse than in Great Britain.

JUDGE GEORGE SMITH HAS BEEN SUPERSEDED
WINDSOR, Sept. 23.—Acting on the recommendation of Hon. W. E. Raney, attorney-general, the provincial cabinet has passed an order-in-council superseding Judge George Smith on the Windsor police commission by Judge J. J. Coughlin. Local officials were notified of the change today.

Judge Smith was appointed to the board of police commissioners after the death of Judge John O. Dromgoole, April 25, 1919.

Announcement of the cabinet's action came as a surprise to civic officials, who were not aware of any impending change in the personnel of the police commission.

It is possible that the city council may make a strong protest against the removal of Judge Smith from the commission.
