

Chinese Children of City Pray For Dead Companion

Twenty-Six Students Hold
Special Service at St.
Andrew's Church.
LOVED BY ALL

Twenty-six Chinese students met at St. Andrew's Presbyterian church yesterday afternoon and prayer for Lee Glin N'g. It was a memorial service for the 14-year-old East London boy, who was found dead early Thursday morning with a bottle of carbolic acid by his side.

Lee had been a regular attendant at St. Andrew's Sunday school for two years. Each week the boy had attended services. He had listened with rapt attention to his teachers' stories of Christianity. He had proved himself one of the most apt pupils in a small class of Canadian Chinese students.

There was a vacant chair yesterday in the little room where the Chinese Sunday school is held at the rear of St. Andrew's. It was Lee's.

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Burns To Death In Huge Furnace

Louisville, Ky., Feb. 7.—Albert Lee Graver, a 12-year-old boy, was so severely burned in a blast furnace of the National Forge Company here today that he died in a few hours afterwards. His parents and a negro janitor at the plant are unable to explain how the youth happened to be inside the furnace, which is used for melting iron.

Lee did not commit suicide," Mr. Welsh said. "N'g was a clever pupil, a thinker, a wise boy. If he took his own life he was temporarily insane. Possibly he was ill and in mistake took a wrong bottle to medicine. Lee didn't take his life. God wanted him."

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MISSION CONGRESS WORK IS EXPLAINED

Rev. R. J. McCormick Tells
of Happenings at Wash-
ton Parley.

The responsibilities of a nation increase with its income. The annual income of the United States has increased from 50 billion to 320 billion dollars. The minister took for his subject: "The World's Missionary Congress." He was present at the gathering in Washington from January 28 to February 2. A congregation which filled the church to capacity was present to hear the results of that spiritual and inspirational congress.

President Coolidge opened the congress and with a megaphone spoke to the 6,000 delegates. He said that the world needs a sweeping religious revival. He spoke of the wealth of the states and added that the added responsibility of increasing wealth must be taken care of. He pleaded for a stronger faith in God.

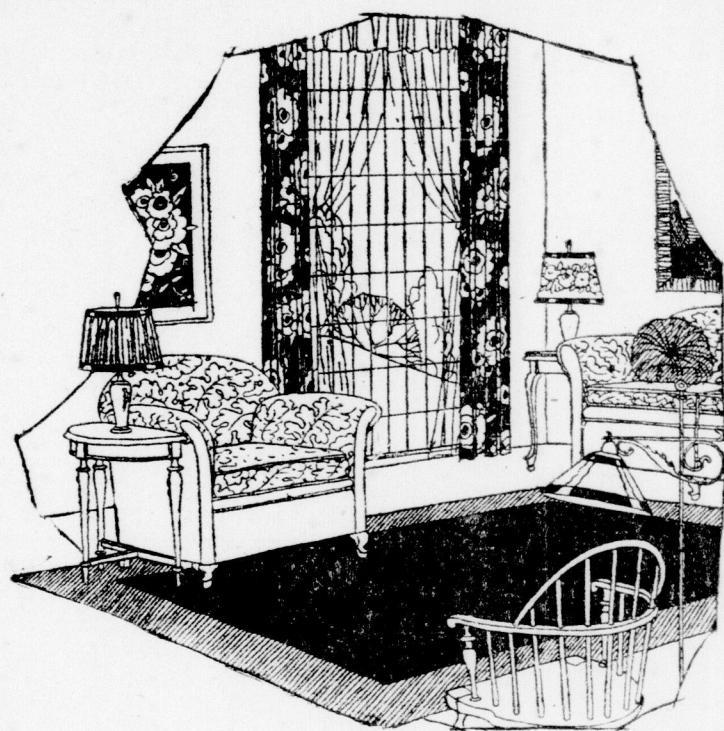
Mr. Case was born in Port Stanley 73 years ago, and came to this city when a young man. He had subscribed to The Advertiser for over 50 years.

Neal's Fig Pudding

2½ cups Neal's bread crumbs
½ cup chopped beef suet
½ lb. finely-chopped figs
1 cup milk

2 eggs
½ cup sugar or syrup
½ teaspoon salt

Work the suet with a wooden spoon until of a creamy consistency, then add the figs. Soak bread crumbs in milk, add well beaten eggs, sugar and salt. Combine mixtures, turn into a buttered mold. Steam three hours. Serve with molasses sauce, which is made by boiling two cups molasses and two tablespoons butter for three minutes. Remove from fire, add two tablespoons lemon juice. Serve hot.
