The Carnegie fund trustees will put up \$100,000 provided the Alberta Catholics contribute the balance.

## CAPACITY CROWDS ACCLAIM EULER

Many Unable To Gain Admission at Meeting in Kitchener.

Kitchener, Oct. 23.—The most enthusiastic meeting that has greeted W. D. Euler, Independent Liberal candidate for North Waterloo, in the present federal elections campaign, was held here this evening in the auditorium of the city hall. Long before the time for calling the meeting to order every available seat in the auditorium was filled and standing room at the back of the hall was at a premium. The crowd that sought admission was so great that an overflow meeting had to be arranged at the Kitchener Hotel. It was a tribute to the work of M. Euler in the house of commons for the past eight years, as well as a token of the strength of Mr. Euler's supporters in the city of Kitchener. The meeting was presided over by Ald. Charles Massel, who has been the representative of Labor on the city council of Kitchener for the last six years.

Karl K. Homuth, Labor member in the provincial legislature for South Waterloo, and C. M. Bowman, of the Mutual Life of Canada, preceded Mr. Euler on the platform. Both speakers deplored the policy adopted by Mr. Meighen in the present campaign in connection with his persistent blue-ruin speeches throughout the country. Mr. Homuth declared that the campaign of Mr. Meighen has been a continued slander of the heritage that has been left to optimistic and patriotic Canadians by the pioneers who hewed a vigorous civilization out of the wilderness. Canada generations ago. He declared the leader of the opposition was lacking in the proper spirit of patriotism when he advertised to the world that his country is on the verge of ruin and advertisement which is not verified by existing facts.

There was no doubt of the sentiments of the meeting when W. D. Euler arose to speak. He was given an ovation which indicated the approval of the electorate in his record of eight years in the house of commons. Mr. Euler discussed briefly the issues before the electorate in the present campaign and criticized his Conservative opponent for his repeated avowals of slavish partisan obedience, and following of all and every policy that will be enunciated by Mr. Meighen. Mr. Euler declared the people want a man who will be free to exercise his judgment in the house and not a slavish follower. He was prepared to support the Liberal government in all measures that insured the interests of the dominion and his riding, but he wanted to reserve his judgment when the disgraced leader of the party in matters of national policy, or on measures which would be against the interests of the riding. The meeting was the most successful that has been held during the present campaign.

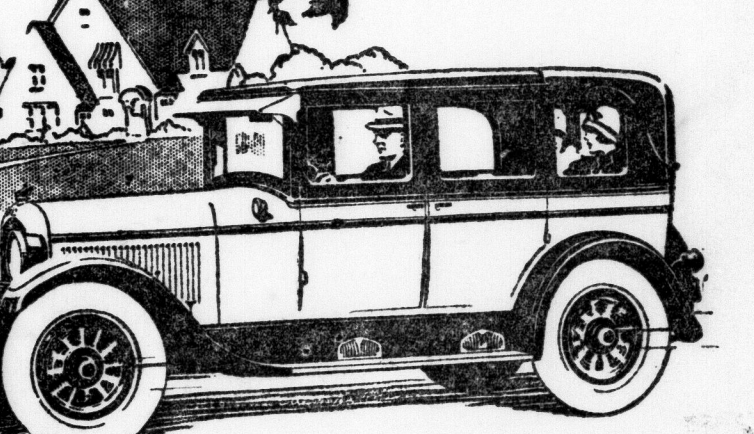
