## WILLIAM HENRY WILLIAMS.

St. Thomas, Aug. 2.—William Henry Williams, a former resident of this city, and a well-known trainman on the C.P.R., died Wednesday morning in Harper's Hospital, Detroit, following an operation, aged 52 years. Mr. Williams was invalided about a year ago, shortly after he left St. Thomas with his family to take up a position on the main line of the C.P.R. He was born in Wicklow county, Ireland, and came to Canada as a young man.

Mr. Williams was prominently connected with Unity Lodge No. 47, Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. He was also a member of I.O.O.F. Lodge No. 76, and of Tecumseh Lodge No. 11, G.O.P.  
Besides his wife, he leaves two daughters and a son: Mrs. A. H. Brockie and Mrs. Margaret Allen, and Russell of Detroit; also three sisters and a brother, Mrs. J. A. Young, Thamesville; Mrs. E. New, and Mrs. R. C. Little, Toronto, and James Williams of Detroit.

The remains will be brought to St. Thomas Saturday on M.C.R. train No. 36, and will be taken to the undertaking parlors of P. R. Williams & Son. Interment will be made in St. Thomas Cemetery. The services will be held under the direction of Unity Lodge at 2:30 o'clock.

The remains will be brought to Guelph for interment, the funeral taking place in Wednesday afternoon.

### Soups, Ices, and Muffins Give Variety To Menus

**Cream of Green Pea Soup.**  
1 pint or one can green peas  
1 quart water  
2 tablespoons butter  
2 tablespoons flour

1-2 teaspoonful salt  
1-16 teaspoonful white pepper  
1-2 teaspoonful sugar  
1 pint milk or cream  
Wash the peas and cook them in one pint of water until soft. Mash them in the water in which they were cooked, strain and add the remaining one pint of water and the milk; make a white sauce, using the liquid and cook until it is like thick cream and serve.

**Potato Soup:**  
3 potatoes  
1 pint milk or  
1 pint milk and water  
2 teaspoonfuls chopped onion  
1 tablespoonful butter  
1 tablespoonful flour  
1-2 teaspoonful salt  
1-8 teaspoonful white pepper

a wire potato masher, add the hot milk, strain and use as a liquid to make a white sauce. Cook five minutes and add the chopped parsley just before serving.

**Rice Soup.**  
1 tablespoonful butter  
1 tablespoonful flour  
1-8 teaspoonful salt  
1-16 teaspoonful pepper  
1-2 cups rice water  
1 cup hot milk  
1 slice onion  
1 tablespoonful chopped parsley  
Cook the rice of onion in the milk in the double boiler until the milk is scalded. Add the rice water and heat again. Make a white sauce, using the liquid, add the parsley and serve at once.

**Muffins.**  
2 cups flour  
4 teaspoons baking powder  
1-2 teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1 cup milk  
1 egg  
1-4 cup oleomargarine  
Combine dry ingredients. Add milk and beaten eggs. Melt the oleomargarine and add it last. Bake about 2 1-2 minutes in greased muffin tins in hot oven. Make 12 muffins.

**Lemon Ice.**  
1 tablespoonful gelatine  
1 tablespoonful cold water  
4 cups boiling water  
2 cups sugar  
2-4 cup lemon juice  
Soak gelatine in cold water five minutes. Make a syrup by boiling water and sugar 20 minutes, and add dissolved gelatine and lemon juice; cool, strain and freeze.

**Apricot Ice.**  
1 tablespoonful gelatine  
1-4 cup cold water  
3 cups boiling water  
2 cups sugar  
1 lemon  
2 cups apricot pulp  
Soak gelatine in the cold water. Make a syrup of boiling water and sugar. Add dissolved gelatine, lemon juice and cooked apricot pulp, which has been rubbed through a strainer. Cool and freeze.

## Hot Weather Dishes Tempt Jaded Summer Appetites

Cooking Expert Gives Instructions For Concocting Attractive Foods by Combining Fruits and Vegetables With Jelly.

Gelatine is a standby when the hot days are with us. Nearly everyone welcomes the cool sparkle of jellied dishes, and their variety is endless. The following recipes are by a cooking expert who knows how to tempt the jaded summer appetite:

**Tomato Salad.**  
Remove the meat from a two-pound lobster, cut it in pieces of uniform size and dress with oil, vinegar and cayenne—let it remain in dressing until well seasoned. Take one envelope of gelatine and soak in one-half cup cold water ten minutes. Place one quart of water in a pan with the outside pieces of celery that cannot be used on the table, add a carrot, an onion and a few sprigs parsley, salt and pepper, and boil gently one hour. There should be two cups of liquid. Add the soaked gelatine and a tablespoonful of lemon juice. Strain and cool.

**Tomato Jelly.**  
Take one and one-half cups of any left-over tomato stew or soup, bring to the boiling point and dissolve in it one tablespoonful gelatine softened in one-half cup cold water ten minutes. Season well. A little chopped onion, pepper or celery may be added for flavor. Strain, turn into mold and chill. Cut in thin slices and serve on lettuce leaves with mayonnaise, or mold in individual cups.

If any hard-boiled eggs are at hand, place slice in the bottom of

small cups and fill with the tomato mixture. Or the tomato jelly may be molded in a thin sheet, cut in squares, spread with cream cheese and put together sandwich fashion.

**Make tomato jelly mixture.** Wash, scrape and cut celery stalks in thin slices crosswise; there should be one cup. Peel and core two large apples, cut in slices and in small pieces. Chop one cup walnut meats. Mix celery, apple and nut meats, and moisten with mayonnaise dressing. Put one tablespoonful tomato jelly mixture in each individual mold. Then add celery, apples and nuts and cover.

**Fruit Salad Supreme.**  
Soak one envelope gelatine in one-half cup cold water and add two cups boiling water, one-half cup mild vinegar and one-half cup sugar. Strain, and when mixture begins to stiffen add three cups fresh fruit, using cherries, oranges bananas or cooked pineapple, alone or in combination. Turn into mold first dipped in cold water, and chill. Remove from mold to nest of crisp lettuce leaves, and accompany with mayonnaise or boiled salad dressing.

### Nutrition Nuggets

Remember that cold meat is much more digestible than meat which has been reheated and cooked in a "made" dish.

Children of two and a half to three years are ready for the addition of green vegetables to their dietaries. Peas, spinach and string beans should always be mashed and put through a vegetable strainer. Asparagus and celery should be given only in the form of strained "stock" combined with milk.

That we may get the best results from our diet it is important to pay attention to environment while eating, to one's condition at the time of eating, and to the reasonably slow method of consuming food.

Dr. Jesse Williams gives these causes of "indigestion": Improper choice of foods, bad cooking, food idiosyncrasies, fatigue, worry, rapid eating, overeating, drinking cold water before eating warm food, constipation, defective teeth, various diseases.

Nothing is more deleterious to the flavor of coffee than lime. If the water is "hard" see that the coffee pot has an extra scrub every day so as to keep it free from deposits.

Children of school age require daily one quart of milk, a part to be used as a beverage, the remainder as a basis for soups and desserts; one green vegetable, one egg, one serving of fresh fruit and one of stewed, whole wheat bread and fresh butter, a little honey or brown sugar and a serving of a meat or protein.

Guard the children's teeth by providing foods that are high in mineral content.
