WHY NOT A FAIR?

At one time this summer it was hoped by a few citizens that Campbellton might hold some sort of celebration or fair here this autumn but judging from all visible signs there has been no definite move made to organize any event of this nature. This is obviously a mistake. It is a lost opportunity.

All around us in towns and cities there will be held within the next months fairs, celebrations and exhibitions which bring in a host of people to these different centres and greatly stimulate the autumn trade. These events have been tried out year after year in many small towns, and we cannot remember of an actual failure in any one case. There is no doubt but what a similar enterprise would benefit Campbellton equally as well. Besides the greatly increased trade from the surrounding districts during the event there is the value of the enterprise from an advertising viewpoint. The idea has solid merits and deserves the consideration of every thoughtful citizen. If nothing can be done this year it means that we have lost one more chance to increase our business slip by, but if the undertaking should be considered feasible for this year, then let us start something at once. If, on the other hand there are intentions of holding another Hospital Fair, why not let everybody take a more active interest for the town's sake and make it a bigger and better event than ever.

A GOOD DOCTRINE.

The good doctrine passed along from one Canadian Board of Trade to another, that Canadian ports should get Canadian trade, is attracting more and more attention, and there is an increasing prospect that shippers, east and west, in increasing numbers, will come to recognize the national importance of the movement. It is no mere selfish plan of the port cities. It is a natural part of any sound national transportation policy. It is a principle recognized by both the Liberal and Conservative parties that our ports and railways should handle the highest possible proportion of Canadian trade, and but lately the government of the day granted an increase in tariff advantage to British goods entering this country direct.

It should be possible through a chain of Boards of Trade spanning the Dominion to influence both shippers and railways by steadily pointing out that all-Canadian transportation means more money for the country and greater unity. In many cases the shipper gives little thought, if any, to the route. In many cases he is unaware of the fact that he can get as good or better results by specifying in all-Canadian route than by neglecting that service to the country and to himself.

Discussion of this matter by business men throughout Canada through their various organizations will do much to impress upon many thousands, who now give little thought, the simple fact that as this country

N.B. DEATH RATE IS THE HIGHEST

This Province Has Heaviest and British Columbia Lightest In Canada

Ottawa, Aug. 15.—New Brunswick has the heaviest infant mortality rate and British Columbia the lightest, according to report upon Canadian vital statistics for January, 1923, issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The infant death rate, figured upon a basis of one thousand living births, is recorded as follows:

Nova Scotia 125.3
New Brunswick 142.4
Ontario 115.4
Manitoba 115.4
Saskatchewan 94.5
Alberta 97.5
British Columbia 72.9

The rate of infant mortality for January, 1923, was higher than that reported for the same month in the three preceding years for which there are national records.

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DIED ON GALLOWS AT REGINA, SASK.

Victor Masson Executed for Murder of Jean Chouveau, Wife and Daughter

Regina, Sask., Aug. 15.—Victor Masson, French farmer of Dumas, Sask., paid the supreme penalty for the murder of Jean Chouveau, Mrs. Chouveau and their daughter, Marie, last February at 5.35 this morning in the jail here.
The execution was carried out without a hitch and a few seconds after the bolt was pulled life was pronounced extinct.
The only remark made by the condemned man after he had mounted the scaffold was "bon jour". It was in the nature of a farewell to his spiritual adviser, Father Blanchus.

NINETY-ONE MINERS DEAD

Explosion in Wyoming Mine Causes Large Loss of Life.

Kemmerer, Wyo., Aug. 15.—Ninety-one bodies had been recovered this morning from the depths of the ill-fated Frontier mine, where 184 miners were entombed by an explosion yesterday, according to anonymous news this morning by J. D. Quasley, vice president and general manager of the Kemmerer Coal Company, owner of the mine.
Kemmerer, Wyo., Aug. 15.—In the grip of sorrow and desolation, Kemmerer, and the little coal camp, suburb, Frontier, one mile away, where approximately 100 miners perished yesterday in an explosion in Mine No. 1 of the Kemmerer Coal Company, already has set about the task of preparing for the funeral. Early today 91 bodies had been recovered.
