Judge Phelps then said: "You have been convicted of the crime of unlawfully and feloniously killing a human being, and a just woman. No attempt has been made to extenuate the barbarity of the deed, and the contrary is proved by the evidence presented to the jury who tried you, and now they turn you over to the court to receive your sentence."

PARIS, Nov. 11.—Between noon and 1 o'clock last night 97 fresh cases of cholera were reported, not include cases and deaths at night.
