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FIRE CHIEF ARDAGH BURIED

Think the Decision Will Bring Immediate Disposition.

Montreal, Jan. 29.—The news that the Privy Council had decided in favour of the Manitoba Catholics in the school question was received with general satisfaction by Roman Catholics generally.

Delton McCarthy's Opinion.

"I am not surprised at the decision," said Delton McCarthy, secretary to the Privy Council.

It is decided now that the Government has the power and it is now a question of discretion.

"I always held to the belief that the Government should have answered the question firmly and have decided that under no circumstances should the Dominion Government interfere with educational matters.

The Government could not do this, however, for in 1891 it was the last time that the Dominion Government had promised the Catholic hierarchy if it could not be given.

"Mr. Laurier is in the same position. It is hardly fitting now for a man in his position to plead ignorance of the scope and effect of the law, and to have no opinion as to the value of the presentation under the direction of Master Workman Kirby.

The action of the Manitoba Government did away with Separate schools and admitted no Protestant, but non-sectarian schools.

"Mr. Laurier says that he doesn't know what the law means, but he knows that the law is in his hands. He will redress them when he comes to power. He must decide now.

"Why should Manitoba school questions be treated differently from other provincial school questions by the Dominion Government?

"The people, I think, believe that they should not when at the approach of an election they have an opportunity of expressing themselves by vote to it as they have done in the past.

"It is a pity," said Col. Fred Denison, M.P., "that the whole question should be settled by the people themselves, who live in Manitoba, and I think it is a question which they alone have a right to settle. It certainly is in the line of provincial rights, and though I do not believe in the right of the Dominion Government to settle it, I think it is a question which should be settled on these lines.

"The opening of the question by the Privy Council was anticipated, in view of the wording of the British North America Act, it seemed impossible that the Dominion Government, until the text of the judgment arrives it is impossible to enter into any criticism of its features. The Government, whichever may be in power when Parliament meets, will now have to take action. The question is one of law and equity only, and in view of this, the decision is not a matter of policy, but a matter of law. The Manitoba school question is into politics once more. More's the pity.

Hamilton Herald: The question is for the politicians to handle, and they would do better to look to anything else, for the way they move, there is sure to be trouble. If they grant the remedial legislation, they will be giving the Protestants, and if they refuse it, the Roman Catholics will be giving the Protestants. If ever there was a case of the Government being clearly between the devil and the deep sea, this is it.

Toronto News: Each province, so long as it violates no Dominion prerogative, is free to do as it pleases with its own government. The people of such provinces are the sole judges as to the policy they wish to follow. It is not for the Dominion Government to interfere with their own affairs. This fact must be clearly and fully recognized by the Ottawa Government. If this is not done, trouble is certain. Any attempt to force Manitoba into adopting a course she does not want to adopt will assuredly lead to civil war.
