Toronto Markets.

Toronto, Oct. 10.—City Cattle Market:—Receipts, 76 cars, with 1,230 head of cattle, 1,000 sheep and lambs, 500 hogs and 129 calves.

There was a fair trade, with a good steady demand for butcher cattle and for good feeders.

Receipts were only moderate, though helped out by about 20 cars of Northwest cattle. The latter comprised a mixed assortment of butchers and feeders. The butchers sold up to \$5.50 and feeders from \$4.40 to \$4.85. Extra choice heavy Ontario feeding steers sold up to \$5.10.

Choice butcher steers and heifers were quoted from \$5.80 to \$6.20, and medium, \$5.50 to \$5.65; common mixed butchers, \$4.44 to \$4.70; cows and bulls, \$3 to \$5, and canners, \$1.50 to \$2.75.

Sheep—Market active and higher; good light ewes up to \$4.25.

Lambs—Market firm and 25c. higher; choice lambs, \$5.50 to \$5.85; bucks, and culls, \$3.

Hogs—Market weak and 35c lower than last week; selects, \$6.15, f.o.b., and \$6.40, fed and watered.
