Late news indicates that the British government is still either blind to the advantages of a reciprocal trade policy with the colonies or is afraid to become responsible for any such radical change in the trade regulations of the United Kingdom.

While the outlook for a better trade arrangement with Great Britain is not encouraging, there is ample evidence of a stir in the United States towards leveling the tariff walls that have hampered the interchange of the natural products of the two countries.

The game warden of Annapolis county have been active in prosecuting violators of the law who have been suspected of moose killing in the close season, and they deserve a good deal of commendation for their zeal.

The Dominion Government is charged by its opponents with having stood in the way of the raising of another Canadian contingent for South Africa. It is said that the troops are needed in South Africa and that the Canadian Government would have been glad of their services, but that our government, after consulting with the raising of the contingent, afterwards raised objections which made it impossible for the British Government to accept them.

Practical Prohibition. In addressing a gathering of temperance orators at San Francisco recently, President McKinley said: "There is no prohibition so potent as that which an individual imposes upon himself, and no temperance lesson like the example of a temperate life."

There are now six vacant seats in the Canadian House of Commons. One is caused by the resignation of a conservative member, one by the death of a conservative, one by the appointment of a liberal, and three by appointments to office. The three vacancies from the last name are in Quebec.

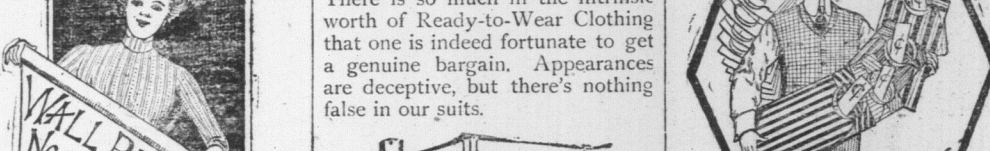
