The amendment was negatived 8 to 7 and after some further discussion the meeting adjourned.

Father LaCumb, Messrs. H. Blesker, Geo. Murdoch and G. B. Elliott. The reception committee was empowered to add to their numbers and arrange details. The general committee then adjourned until Saturday evening 23rd inst.
