Secretary—Mr. Jas. G. Shaw, proposed by Mr. Geo. Sumner, seconded by Mr. J. S. Shearer, whose election was carried unanimously.

Each of the newly appointed officers thanked the members for the high honor bestowed upon them by election to such very important offices.

By a unanimous vote the retiring officers received the thanks of the meeting for their close attention and zeal manifested in promoting the welfare of the Society during their term of office.

The retiring President, Mr. J. Stevenson Brown, in congratulating the Society upon its selection of officers, took occasion to thank the members for the kindly manner in which they had assisted him in the administration of the affairs of the Society during his three years of office. He expressed his gratitude for the perfect harmony which had characterized all its meetings and bespoke the same kind consideration for his successor—'com he had now the pleasure of calling to the chair.
