The British Columbia Rifle association prize meeting began on Wednesday 10th August and lasted three days. The attendance was rather disappointing to the officers of the association. the roll numbering only about forty competitors. The necessary postponement of the matches from the date originally fixed, was in part responsible, the new date not suiting all concerned. It had been expected that a strong team would be present from Nanaimo, where the shooting interest has of late been strong and general disappointment was expressed when it was found that that place, as well as Vancouver city, was quite unrepresented on the range.

The officers of the association on duty were Capt. Fletcher, the secretary, who exercised a general supervision; Capt. Dorman, treasurer, who attended to the issue of the firing tickets and compiled the lists of winners; and Capt. Smallfield, who was range officer, and gave general satisfaction in that rather trying position. The president, Lieut.-Col. Prior, M.P., not only gave the encouragement of his presence, but was also a formidable competitor in the various events, and rendered material assistance in the supervision of the marking. The Upper House was also represented, in the person of Senator McInnes, who is an expert as well as enthusiastic rifleman, and captain of the Senate rifle team; Lieut.-Col. At this range New Westminster got a slight lead of six points. The teams and individual scores were:
