A BOVE is an engraving of a very elegant Daguerrectype case executed in white Parian marble, righly carved, and designed to be attached to monuments and monumental stones, and to contain a daguerrectype, or other likeness of the deseased. The likeness is placed in a brass case made perfectly air and water-tight, and protected from the light and weather by a curved marble covering, which moves upon a pivot, as seen in the cut. This brass case is insorted in an aperture made in the back of the marble case, and the whole is fastened to the monument or in an aperture made in the back of the marble case, and the whole is fastened to the monument or grave stone, by means of two, and sometimes four, screws.
