IX THE MEXICAN IMPORT TARIFF SYSTEM AND TECHNICAL STANDARDS

As a result of Mexico's accession to GATT, the Mexican Government has gradually opened the economy to international markets. Tariffs have been lowered from a maximum 100% in 1983 to a maximum of 20% in December 1988. The official price system has been eliminated and import permits are required on less than 300 of the toal 8,310 items in the Mexican Tariff Act. Import of plastic production equipment are subject to an ad-valorem duty mmaximum of 20% although the actual range is between 5 to 15% (AVD) assessed on the C.I.F. invoice value. In addition a customs processing fee (CPF) of 0.6% is assessed on the C.I.F. invoice value.

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
