HOUSING

POSSIBILITY OF REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATIONS

Hon. Robert K. Andras (Minister without Portfolio): I wish to reply to two questions posed the other day in my absence. The hon. member for Nanaimo-Cowichan-The Islands asked a question with regard to the intentions of the government to seek additional appropriations for housing in addition to those now outlined in the estimates. There are two sources for C.M.H.C. loans and advances. One is the estimates which have been approved in the amount of \$114 million. The other is statutory votes. These two comprise the capital budget which is approved by order in council and tabled in the house. That amount this year will be \$680 million. Over and above direct a question to the Minister of Transport that there is \$49 million provided in the estimates for grants and subsidies. There is no minister advise the house of the current posiadditional increase contemplated at this time.

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Mr. T. C. Douglas (Nanaimo-Cowichan-The raised under the bill which he is going to introduce Monday, there has been no increase in the financial allotments over and above what has already been provided in the figures given to the house?

Mr. Andras: If the bill is approved, Mr. Speaker, the financial allotment increase will permit the capital budget expenditures to be dealt with over the next three or four years. An increase to \$15 billion will give us that leeway.
