#### AIRPORTS

#### TORONTO-INQUIRY AS TO DECISION ON NEW SITE

Mr. W. M. Howe (Wellington-Grey-Dufferin-Waterloo): Mr. Speaker, I make no apology for the fact that I represent parts of the four most important counties in the province of Ontario. I have a question for the Minister of Transport. It is in connection with the new airport that is proposed to be built north and west of Toronto. Some time ago the minister indicated that a decision would be handed down this fall. In view of the interest in many areas, particularly in my own riding, can the minister advise when we may expect a statement and decision on this very important matter?

Hon. Donald C. Jamieson (Minister of Transport): I thank the hon. member for whatever it is-for his question. The situation is as follows: In the first instance the detailed studies referred to in earlier questions and answers have been completed. The data, which is formidable in terms of size, is now being prepared in report form in order to get it down to manageable size. We will be holding discussions with the province of Ontario, as I committed myself to do, as soon as this work is completed, which I would anticipate would be within ten days to two weeks. The nature of our discussions with the province of Ontaric will be to see if some mechanism can be devised whereby we can obtain the maximum amount of public participation in this matter before a decision is made. The central problem remains the one I mentioned in June, protection against the possibility of land speculation in advance of our final decision.

Mr. A. D. Hales (Wellington): Mr. Speaker, I wish to direct a supplementary question to the minister. Have the proposed sites been narrowed down to three, four or five, and is the area of Beverley township, which is in my riding, one of them?

Some hon. Members: Oh, oh!
