AIRLINE DISASTERS

Mr. George S. Baker (Gander-Grand Falls): Mr. Speaker, today marks the sixth anniversary of the worst air disaster on Canadian soil. To this day, the cause of the crash is not known.

The similarities between the Arrow air disaster in Canada and the Pan Am disaster over Lockerbie, Scotland are striking. Both aircraft left from North Africa taking U.S. soldiers back home for Christmas. Both aircraft landed in West Germany. Both carried out unidentified baggage. In both instances, the eye witness accounts were identical, denoting that there was a pre-crash fire. The similarities end there.

The glaring difference is that for the past three years the FBI and Scotland Yard have been examining every minute piece of wreckage to find the cause in Lockerbie whereas in Canada no such thorough investigation took place.

I am calling on the Government of Canada and the government of the United States to end this shameless disregard for how 256 people were killed on Canadian soil six years ago today and open a new and thorough examination.
