passed in the House of Representatives, instructing the Federal Reserve people and the Government to make such arrangements as would ensure the raising of the price level to the average attained between the years 1921-1929. It reminded one of the Chinese, who, being confronted with the ignorance of the majority of the Chinese people, stated that they had passed a law abolishing ignorance from the first of the next year. One also notes that the British Columbia government, in return for the high duties placed on B.C. coal entering the United States, are advocating the gractical prohibition of the entry of American products. The economics practised generally are of a very childish nature.

But I must not ramble

on in this super-critical fashion.

We are all very well at home. Lady Currie and Marjorie are busy getting ready for Marjorie's wedding in the middle of June. We have just had a visit from Lord Irwin, and in a fortnight expect Lord Byng for three days. I understand he is incapable of enduring much fatigue, and has asked that functions in his honour be few and of a very quiet character.

I hope that you have fully recovered from the effects of your very serious operation, and that both you and Mrs. Marler are well and continue to enjoy the duties of your very responsible position.
