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GARRISON PARADE WAS STIRRING SPECTACLE

More Than 2700 Men Marched From the Armories to Massey Hall, and Were Viewed by Many Thousands of People on the Long Return Route.

Proud, indeed, were the thousands of mothers, sisters, kiddies and now or soon-to-be better halves, of the great array of Toronto's soldier lads who marched thru the city streets yesterday, glorying in the brightness alike of the spring day and their smart uniforms.

Soon after 2 o'clock the boys gathered in the armories and the crowd assembled as quickly on the outside. A few minutes after the city hall clock showed the half hour the van of the long procession of color began its short march eastward to Massey Hall.

When the Parade Really Began. In about an hour the real march began, and no time was lost when once outside of Massey Hall. Formation was quickly made, and the Highlanders marched eastward along the river-front to Jarvis with bag-pipes whining and drums beating a rhythm that would have made a rheumatic feel like marching.

While Mary Jane was, of course, present to admire Harry, and mother to feel proud of having married father, and little Daisy to feel happy that the said father was the only man in step with the whole rest of the 550 men, it may be safely said that the majority of the people gathered were strangers to the boys who marched so triumphantly by.

Over 2700 Men Out. Brigadier-General Cotton was in command of the parade, which was divided under him into commands of cavalry and infantry. The 54 horses were under Col. W. H. Merritt, while Col. W. C. Macdonald controlled the 250 individuals who made up the infantry column.

In Massey Hall. Within Massey Hall a great scene presented itself. Not often can one see close to three thousand soldier lads dressed in those patriotic colors that bring so well, joining lustily in the singing both of hymns and the closing national anthem.

And still the Wilton-avenue bridge is unfinished. One would have thought that it would have been ready to receive some of the congestion at the Don crossing of Queen-street, and some of the congestion caused by the seven days' racing that begins Saturday next.

KAISER IN ENGLAND ON A STATE VISIT
