NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—The frequency and atrocity of crimes against women and children in New York in the past fortnight have brought about heroic measures. Acting Police Commissioner O'Keefe

He ordered that house to house visits be made by ail officers on regular heats and that parents be adjustice the perpetrators of these regular beats and that parents be advised to keep their children under closer supervision. He also announced that he would ask the board of estimate and appropriation for an appropriation sufficient to add five hundred officers to the force.

The attacks on children recently have struck terror to the hearts of parents all over the city, and scores of cases of supposed attempts at assault have been reported to the police which have no foundation, except in

the fears of parents. But notwithstanding the cases which have no foundation in fact there have been enough actual cases of assault on children to cause the police as well as parents much worry.

The police arrested four brothers. Thomas, Louis, George and James Esposito, believing that they could throw some light on the murder of little Katie Tietschler, whose mutilated body was found in a cellar on First-avenue. Later all but Louis were discharged. Louis, when confronted with evidence that he was seen to emerge from the cellar, admitted that he cut wood there the day Katie discant lot. Her screams brought a crowd, who attacked Sallo and were only prevented from seriously injuring him by a policeman, who drove them back with his revolver. The body of the young woman found
